Opportunity for us to better understand the Maltese diaspora" – Minister Ian Borg

"The Council of Maltese Living Abroad is a very important opportunity for us to better understand how the Maltese diaspora is looking at our country from abroad and also to explain our vision when it comes to foreign politics." This outlined by Minister for Foreign and European Affairs and Trade lan Borg while addressing the 14th Annual Meeting of the Council of Maltese Living Abroad. This meeting, established by law, is taking place between the 27th and 28th October 2022, at the Ministry for Foreign and European Affairs and Trade in Palazzo Parisio, Valletta.

In his opening speech, Minister lan Borg welcomed the Council Members for the first physical meeting after a two-year absence because of the pandemic. He emphasised that the Sustainable Development Goals 2050 will be the main guiding principles for the Ministry in its work and that his aim during these two days of the Council Meeting is to brainstorm about how the Maltese diaspora and the Council

can become a mechanism of change. Climate change, the war in Ukraine, the energy crisis, the instability in Libya and the disparity between the rich and the poor are a few of the main themes that are part of this meeting's agenda.

Minister lan Borg spoke about action taken the bv the Ministry when launching the online Form known as 'Form V -Voluntary Registration of Maltese Persons of Value living abroad' with the aim of attracting Maltese living abroad to collaborate with the Maltese Government in their specific fields. The Ministry looks forward to receiving voluntary registrations from such Maltese with such wealth a experience, to collaborate with them in line with the Ministry's vision of Global Malta.

recalled also how September the Ministry organised its first Virtual Youth Forum for youth living abroad with the theme 'I want to connect: Maltese language, culture and identity.' Another goal that was reached this year was the setting up of the Regional Councils with the aim that the Ministry gets closer to the Maltese communities living abroad at grassroots levels and with an emphasis on more connectivity that forms part of the Government Electoral Manifesto.

The Council of Maltese Living Abroad meets in Malta in October 2022

The Council Agenda during these days will also include a commemoration of Monsignor Philip Calleja who was the first Director of the Migrants Commission and who died very recently in August: more sustainable travelling; matters related to Maltese citizenship and passports; revision of the Act setting up the Council for Maltese Living Abroad; matters related to Maltese culture and heritage and less bureaucracy in the provision of services, amongst others.

This Council is made up of 15 members including members from Australia, the United States, Canada, Belgium, the United Kingdom, France, Egypt and the United Arab Emirates.

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His Excellency Dr George Vella President of Malta welcoming members of the diplomatic Corps

H. E. Constance J. Milstein - Ambassador of the United States to Malta

President Vella welcomed the Ambassador to Malta and referred to the ample potential to intensify bilateral relations, which both agreed, are excellent. Ambassador Milstein underlined her commitment to work with all stakeholders in Malta to ensure that contacts are further consolidated.

Several regional issues were discussed during the meeting, with focus being placed on the war in Ukraine and instability in the Mediterranean. President Vella observed that there are several pressing issues in the region, ranging from the continued instability in Libya, tensions in the Eastern Mediterranean and the worrying scenario concerning the Middle East Peace Process. Migration was also raised, with President Vella recalling a US resettlement programme of refugees from Malta which is no longer in operation, stating that this mechanism had been of great support to Malta.

H. E. Youssef Balla, Ambassador of the Kingdom of Morocco to Malta

In welcoming the Ambassador, President Vella referred to the longstanding relations between the two countries, which along the years have been consolidated through the participation in Mediterranean fora, such as the Western Mediterranean Forum and the Union for the Mediterranean. President Vella also referred to Malta's support to closer relations between the European Union and Morocco. On the bilateral front, President Vella observed that there remains room for improved trade exchanges.

On trade relations, Ambassador Balla stated that Morocco is very well-positioned to be Malta's trade gateway to Africa. He also elaborated with the President that Morocco looks very positively at the leading role that Malta has taken along the years on Mediterranean issues, especially within the European Union. The Ambassador stated that Morocco fully understands Malta's concerns regarding insecurity in the region as well as other pressing challenges such as climate change and energy resources.

The situation concerning migration was also raised, with President Vella underlining the importance that Malta attaches to cooperation with Moroccan authorities on this subject.

H.E. Gloria Gangte, High Commissioner of the Republic of India to Malta

Her Excellency described relations between the two countries as traditionally excellent and underlined her determination to make sure that this partnership continues to develop in line with geopolitical and technological developments. The areas of digitalisation, pharmaceuticals, and health were mentioned as those being among the most promising.

President Vella welcomed the High Commissioner's commitment and added that relations have been further enriched through the presence of a sizeable community of Indian nationals employed in #Malta, primarily in the healthcare sector. The President referred to ongoing projects of cooperation in the Commonwealth and Asia-EU Meeting among others and

H.E. Erika Bernhard, Ambassador of the Republic of Austria to Malta

Since establishing diplomatic relations in 1966, the relationship between Malta and Austria has always continued to flourish and get stronger throughout the years. On the occasion of the National Day of the Federal Republic of Austria, The President remarked that the friendly dialogue is not only driven by political and commercial interests but is also primarily motivated by a set of shared interests and beliefs. Trusting in Austria's shared vision of a more peaceful and prosperous world, the President is confident that Malta will continue to find an important partner in multilateral fora and, together with other likeminded countries, advance harmonious policies of unity, peace and prosperity.

FIFA WORLD CUP 2022 OFFICIAL POSTER

The Official Poster is on display at Hamad International Airport, where it will remain at Gate D18 throughout the FIFA World Cup 2022. Everyone will have the chance to see the poster as they travel from and transit through Qatar.

This series of eight posters were created through close collaboration with prominent Qatari artist Bouthayna Al Muftah. The artworks combine to convey the values and messages of the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022 in a subtle, unique and relevant way – while remaining closely connected with local culture and heritage.

The main poster focuses on the football itself, featuring the *agal* – a traditional head piece worn in Qatar – alongside typography expressing the voices of a cheering crowd. Just like the beautiful game, the artist's approach is raw and emotive, packed with palpable movement and energy. This approach aims to create a dialogue with fans – igniting all their senses.

AN ICON FOR A NEW FIFA WORLD CUP 2022

The FIFA World Cup 2022™ emblem incorporates the burgundy and white colours that are synonymous with Qatar's national flag. The emblem's design embodies the vision of an event that connects and engages the entire world, while also featuring striking elements of local and regional Arab culture, as well as references to the beautiful game.

The swooping curves of the emblem represent desert dunes, and the unbroken loop depicts both the number eight – representing the tournament's host stadiums – and the infinity symbol, reflecting the event's interconnected nature, fusing tradition with modernity.

A killer storm that claimed four lives in 1979



An intense storm which ravaged Malta and Gozo left four people dead and caused mayhem. Monsoon-like rain on the afternoon of Thursday, October 25, 1979, turned streets into raging rivers, trapping people in floating cars and flooding scores of properties. Dramatic rescues were carried out by the police and the army, but the storm was a horror story for several families. In Misrah Kola, Attard, a 55-year-old woman, Vivienne Huntingford, was trapped in the basement of her house by a sudden rush of water which guickly flooded it. Her husband desperately tried to rescue her, but there was nothing he In Qormi, Anthony Galea, 64, was could do. driving home with his wife and niece after visiting a relative at St Vincent de Paul Home.

One of the victims is found. A torrent of water



flooded their car. They abandoned it, but were immediately carried away. The women were rescued but Mr Galea was missing for hours. His dead body was eventually found in a field in Mdina

Road, Qormi. Another victim, Briton John Herbert Moore, 51, was found dead the next day at the Marsa sports ground having gone missing some miles away, in Siġġiewi.

He and his wife had abandoned their car when it was flooded by storm water. His wife held to a tree branch for dear life, and was rescued by a group of people but Mr Moore was dragged away by the swirling waters, down the valley and all the way to Marsa where he was found under a bridge amid a maze of vegetation and debris. The fourth victim was Lorraine Wales, 39, an English tourist. Her body was found in the sea at Salina by two hunters, two days after the storm. Mrs Wales had been miles away, in a car at Chadwick Lakes with her husband and two other men when their vehicle was carried away.

Cows swimming in the floodwaters

Many properties were flooded. At least one horse drowned in a garage in the Birkirkara valley close to where the McDonalds restaurant is now located. In Qormi, residents reported cows trying to swim in the floodwaters. At Żebbuġ, some 800 chickens died when their cages were swept away.

Also at Żebbuġ, a fireworks factory was hit by lightning, but no one was injured. Such was the power of the floodwaters that scores of cars and vans were dragged 'like cardboard boxes' according to a *Times of Malta* report of the time. Two days after the storm, three people were dead. By the end of that day, the death toll would rise to four. Twelve vehicles including two vans ended up in a large heap of twisted metal under the Birkirkara bridge. Three cars were stacked on top of each other. It was even worse in Gozo, where 26 cars were swept into the sea at Xlendi.

Dramatic rescues

A 19-year-old girl was also swept into the bay but was rescued. Also rescued, in the nick of time, was a girl in a Ford Transit van belonging to the Salina Bay Hotel. The van ended up in the graveyard of cars in Birkirkara.

In Marsa, some 30 people were trapped at the sports ground and some of them, including a pregnant woman, were rescued by a helicopter of the Armed Forces of Malta in what was their first major rescue operation since the departure of the British forces earlier that year. Others were ferried on dinghies.

Inevitably, traffic ground to a halt with many people trapped at their place of work during what was supposed to be the rush hour.



But it was worse for some 130 workers at the pig farm in Comino. The patrol boat which usually picked them up could not make the crossing. They were given shelter at the Comino Hotel.

Roads and boundary walls in several localities collapsed, notably in St Paul's Bay, in Attard near Wied Incita, in Burmarrad and along a section of Msida Valley Road, where bulldozers had to be used to remove the debris. Many homes in Msida and St Paul's Bay were under metres of water and had to be evacuated. Several properties in Main Street, St Paul's Bay was later declared unsafe.

Two days after the storm, part of the parvis in front of Ta' Pinu church in Gozo collapsed and two statues of the Way of the Cross fell into a field. The bad weather had continued for a few more days, with three cars being swept into the sea at Wied il-Mielaħ in Gozo. Cars piled on top of each other after being dragged by floodwater.

Following the storm, the government announced special financial assistance for farmers who had seen extensive damage to crops and property. The curias in Malta and Gozo also set up solidarity funds and made their own donations. Collections on All Souls Day were channelled to the fund.

The Maltese Islands were battered by severe gale force winds blowing at about 133km/h on October 11, 1982. Anthony Bianco, 47, and his wife Carmen, 51, died when the roof of their house collapsed in Arcades Street in Paola. Carmen was killed instantly while her husband passed away a few hours later at St Luke's Hospital.

Catherine Cutajar, 70, from Zurrieq, who worked for a family on Tower Road in Sliema, died when part of the house's roof collapsed.

As Teatru Manoel approaches its 300th anniversary, CEO MASSIMO

ZAMMIT (pictured) shares how Malta's national theatre has endured through the centuries, stays relevant for today's audiences, and builds a sustainable future for the island's arts community.

As the third-oldest working in Europe, Teatru theatre Manoel has witnessed nearly three centuries of Malta's history. Ever since its namesake António Manoel de Vilhena -Grand Master of the Order of St commissioned John construction in 1731, the theatre has become the epitome of endurance the island as survived colonisations. invasions and world wars.

Yet, despite the passage of time, Teatru Manoel is still significant to today's society. "The Manoel is Malta's epicentre cultural entertainment." confirms Teatru Manoel CEO Massimo Zammit. "It offers some of the best productions and musicals in Malta, and every show is immediate, evolving, and different. Although the script changes, everv performance is unique and offers a distinct and irreplicable experience."

By virtue of being a theatre, the Manoel also stays relevant, he explains: "Theatre is among the ancient art forms and yet it grows and evolves, adapting with time and staying both relevant to current events and relatable for audiences," he says. "Theatre helps us see different perspectives, reminds us we are not alone and promotes education, literacy, social discourse, dialogue, and

While sustaining Malta's everevolving arts landscape - and the artists that are its lifeblood - Teatru Manoel also keeps environmental sustainability at core. "Becoming sustainable and minimising our carbon footprint remains a key focus," shares the CEO. "The theatre's recent refurbishment included the installation of energy-efficient lighting and a ventilation and acclimatisation system, in the auditorium. Likewise, we are also exploring the possibility of avoiding adding textile waste to through landfill sourcina costumes from second-hand shops and prioritising the use of existing costume stock."

Collaboration – both in terms of sharing best practices on sustainability and partnering with the key players in Malta's arts sector – is also integral to the Manoel's ongoing mission to provide a platform for the artistic community. In fact, such a partnership is behind Malta's latest smash-hit musical, *La Cage Aux Folles*, co-produced by the Manoel and leading



theatre company FM Theatre Productions.

"This partnership augurs well for other similar collaborations in the future. They help to drive growth, build a resilient artistic community, and produce events that through such collaborations reach new heights," remarks Zammit. "Ours is a national theatre that supports and serves the community's vibrant performing arts productions; an inclusive, innovative theatre that is relevant to everyone."

Crypt in Rabat Restored - open for the public

The crypt in Rabat.



Underneath the sanctuary dedicated to St Joseph in Rabat, there is crypt whereby *Fratelli* and *Consore* members Archconfraternity of St Joseph, are referred to have been buried. This crvpt burial custom continued until the 1970s, after which burials within churches were stopped. However, from beginning of the the 21st century, permission given for the transportation of remains to churches, following burial in a cemetery. Since the crypt started to be used again, work has taken place to keep it in a dignified state.

The paint was stripped off, showing the limestone beneath.

In the crypt, there are two stone altars since the crypt was dug during two different periods. The first room was excavated in 1670 when the chapel dedicated to St Joseph above it was rebuilt; here one finds a sculpture of St Joseph with the souls from Purgatory. One of the altars in the crypt.

The second part extends beneath the oratory, nowadays known as the sanctuary of St Joseph. This was excavated in 1839, as suggested by the date under the opening that leads to the sanctuary. Another altar, together with a stone statue of St Joseph holding the child Jesus, is found here.

During the past few months, extensive work was done to further embellish the crypt.

On Monday, November 7, at 6pm, a mass dedicated to the souls of the persons buried in this location will be said in the crypt. On Wednesday, November 9, another mass will be said in the sanctuary dedicated to St Joseph (within the Ta' Gieżu church in Rabat), with suffrage for the souls of the dead members of the Archconfraternity of St Joseph, L'Isle Adam Musical Society and 19th March Pyrotechnic Factory. When mass is over, a procession will take place, starting from the sanctuary and ending in the crypt with the blessing of the graves. The Archconfraternity of Saint

Joseph advises that on Saturday, October 29, from 5 to 7pm and on Sunday, October 30, from 7am to noon, the crypt beneath the sanctuary will be open to the public.

The crypt will also be open to the relatives of the buried members during the whole month of November.

QAGĦAQ TAL-ĦMIRA MALTESE YEAST RINGS

Qagħaq tal-Ħmira, or Yeast rings, are small pillowy soft aniseed spiced buns covered with sesame seeds. A traditional Maltese sweet treat to enjoy for breakfast or as a teatime snack.

WHAT ARE QAGHAQ TAL-HMIRA?

If you ever visit a Maltese bakery or see a Maltese baker van roaming around the streets, you will see piles on piles of bags filled with about a dozen of small yeast rings. Those would be the qaghaq, which normally are sold in bags of 6 or 12. The best part is that often you have to separate the buns yourself; since they will be still all sticking to one another just like when the baker takes them out of the oven. These qaghaq tal-hmira basically are sweet soft and fluffy buns topped with sesame seeds and resemble the shape of a bagel. They are infused with aniseed, cloves and orange zest, which is their significant unique characteristic.

Most probably, these qagħaq are another version of the many Ka'ak popular in the countries of the Levant and North Africa. Malta has many influences from these countries, both from their cuisines and their language.

TIP FOR BAKING THE QAGHAQ TAL-HMIRA

As these qagħaq tal-ħmira are basically sweetened bread, I used a technique to help with the cooking of the bread in a normal home oven. This technique will help with the rising of the dough in the oven, thus will result in the bread rings to be way more fluffier. All that is needed is to fill a small dish with a thin layer of water. Place this dish in the oven in the bottom rack, and place the baking tray with the yeast rings on the higher shelf. The steam created will make the baking so much better!

RECIPE

Qagħaq tal-Ħmira, or Yeast rings, are small pillowy soft aniseed spiced buns covered with sesame seeds. A traditional Maltese sweet treat to enjoy for breakfast or as a teatime snack.

Servings: 36 rings INGREDIENTS

600 g strong bread flour 275 ml milk *lukewarm* 125 ml water *lukewarm* 10 g active dry yeast 2 tbsp whole aniseed 1/2 tsp ground cloves zest of an orange 50 g margarine 100 g sugar golden sesame seeds



INSTRUCTIONS

In a small bowl mix together the lukewarm water, milk, yeast and sugar. Set the mixture aside until it froths. This usually takes about 15 minutes.

November 2022

In a mixer or in a large bowl, mix the flour, aniseeds, cloves and orange zest together and make a well. Add the margarine and the yeast mixture in the well.


Start kneading or mixing the dough in the mixer. If you are going to knead the dough by hand it should take you about 20 minutes. Whereas with the mixer the dough should be done in 10 minutes. The dough should be sticky, so don't add any extra flour to it.

Place the dough in a bowl, cover and let it proof for about 1 hour. After this resting time it should be double in size. Prepare a plate with a good layer of sesame seeds. Set aside

Preheat the oven to 220°C or 430°F. Line a baking tray with parchment paper. Prepare also a small dish with water. Set aside.

Once rested, punch the dough down and divide into 36 pieces. About 25-30g each. Roll each piece into a 20cm log and join both the ends together tightly. Dip the ring into the plate with sesame seeds.

Place each ring on the baking sheet, leaving only some space between one another. Cover and let rest for 30 minutes. Place the dish with water in the oven in the bottom rack. Bake the qaghaq for about 10 minutes until they have a nice golden brown colour

This 90-minute film production is based on the epic poem of INANNA's most famous myth "The Descent of Inanna" found written on a cuneiform 5500 years ago. INANNA is the myth of the goddesses' descent and rise from the Underworld. Goddess of Love. Beauty, Sex, Desire. Fertility, War, Combat, Justice, and Political Power, the 5500 vear - old tale of the Goddess INANNA embodies a celebration of womanhood. Female deities were worshiped and adored through all Prehistoric history, but the Goddess who outweighed, outlasted overshadowed, and all was the Goddess them INANNA. She has roots as far back as the Neolithic era. In an attempt to save her ego, Inanna mistakenly kills her sister's husband, instead of Gilgamesh (her past lover). To right this wrong, Inanna must admit her fault and beg forgiveness from her sister, the guardian of the Underworld. As Inanna descends to her sister's realm, she is challenged to change her selfish ways at each of the 7 gates by removing her 7 degrees of the divine representing the chakras, increasing her enlightenment at each passage. When she reaches the underworld, her sister does not forgive her, and Inanna is killed. Inanna is brought back to life, but for her to leave the Underworld. someone must replace her. Damuzi, her current lover, proves to be unfaithful and is sent for six months of the year. When Damuzi and Inanna are apart—that is, in fall and winter the land is infertile. When they are together—in spring summer—the becomes land fertile and fruitful. This Sumerian myth parallels the Greek myth of Persephone and Demeter.

The fascinating film is the "proof of concept" for what promises to be an incredible future live production.

close range, and following a Maia goal bringing both teams level, Jefferson headed Jackson Mendoza's freekick home for a 3-2 lead prior to Gudja saving a point by equalising five minutes from time.

Gzira took home the valuable 3 points against Hibernians where Jefferson scored both goals in their 2-1 victory, in a match where he was also voted as the BOV Player of the Match.

The Ghonnella, sometimes referred to as a Faldetta, is a form of women's head dress and shawl, or hooded cloak, unique to the Mediterranean islands of Malta and Gozo. From a practical perspective, this broad bonnet captured much needed cooling breezes during the hot Maltese summer. On cooler days, the wearer could wrap the Ghonnella around her face more tightly, by making a slight adjustment.

The lower part of the Ghonnella could be worn loosely draped around the wearer's bodice and hips, or more

tightly wrapped in the case of inclement weather.

He says: "It's important for me being based in the Arts Quarter and having other artists close by and it's great for visitors because in just a short distance they get to see so many different crafts. I think of myself that I'm selling stories not objects – the guy who enters into my little shop, he has no idea that he will buy a carved wooden spoon for his mother,

and this is actually what I like. because I help people discover what they are looking for".



symbolic imagery. He says: My carved spoon featuring the rooster is called 'the hope' because he announces a fresh day every morning, and my owl spoon signifies 'wisdom' as she sees where people are not able to see and I also have the lovers spoon featuring two birds. The dragon spoon is inspired by Chinese mythology, where dragons are seen as a


protectors of their citadels, and so the carved dragon is a protector of the home carved underneath. And of my little shop, I believe that any art without a story is unfinished and so every time I carve something I try to include symbols."

Mark's Grandfather taught him the craft of woodcarving and Mark believes working with wood is in his DNA. Today he enjoys using his grandfather's tools to continue this family tradition and is looking forwards to incorporating a teashop into the business, so customers can sit next to his carved wooden tables, sip tea and soak up the wonderful surroundings.

They illustrate three images, all of which refer in some way, to our local culture.

The stamp set is designed by Fabio Agius, Lee Townsend and Mario Torrisi. The stamps will be issued in a sheet of 10 stamps, with each

November is the month in which the locals in Malta might experience the first few cold days after the warm season. As is typical with the weather on the island, the sun will likely still be shining but



temperatures will start to drop.

At the same time, students and workers will be working hard before the Christmas period rolls around, with few visitors coming to the island due to similar reasons. This means visiting in November is likely to mean you experience quiet and uncrowded sites and locales, with pleasant sunshine although slightly colder temperatures.

While November is far from being considered a "cold" month of the year, it's normal for temperatures to start

dropping around this time. Usually, early November is characterised with some hot days that locals refer to as 'the summer of St Martin' (after the Saint whose feast is celebrated at the start of the month). This essentially means that the first few weeks of November will be those of an Indian summer.

The weather typically starts to cool down from mid-month onwards, with certain days being uncharacteristically wet, windy, and cold. Don't worry though. The temperatures are far from settling down and it's very normal to have a cold spell with rain, followed by days that are sunny and warm.



GHAQDA MUZIKALI MARIJA ASSUNTA GUDJA



The Circolo Musicale Santa Marija was the first Musical society in Gudja, established about the year 1883. After some ups & downs, the new circolo Musicale Santa Marija closed its doors for the last time in 1915.

At the beginning of 1919, Messers Abram Zammit, Loretu Thewma, Giuseppi Gatt and john Baldacchino, started discussions about the formation of a musical society to help the Feast of Santa Marija and also organise the feast of our Lady Of Consolation at Gudja. The number of persons supporting this idea

was so encouraging that a premises was officially opened on Friday 16th May 1919 as "Circolo Musicale Indipendente". On the 7th of June 1919 the circolo was one of those clubs showing Sympathy for the 4 Maltese persons killed in Valletta, by hosting the flag at half-mast. Later in 1919, an orchestra was formed under Mro Ferdinandu (Dandu) Falzon.

In 1936, Circolo Musicale Indipendente changed its name to King Edward VIII Musical Club.

During 1939-1945 war, the club premises were offered to the civil Authorities to house the refuges after the first air raids of 11th June 1940.

On the 12th April 1942 the premises were damaged during an air attack, and all documents and Trophies were lost.

On the 10th September 1943 Mro Anthony Micallef was entrusted with the formation of a band, which was inaugurated on the 13th August 1944 by Mons Emmanuel Galea, Bishop Of Tralles as Our Lady of Consolation Band Club.


In 1993, Our Lady Of Consolation Band Club changed its name to Ghaqda Muzikali Maria Assunta. The Maria Assunta Band is still taking an active part in the celebrations at Gudja of the feast of Our Lady Of Consolation which falls on the last Sunday of October, as well as Santa Marija, the Patron Saint of Gudja on 15th August. In the olden times, when people were very poor, the local Festa was the only means of entertainment, wearing their best clothes, having a special dinner and participating in the celebrations.

Today the standard of living has improved but the tradition of the Local Festa is still very strong. Since its formation in 1919, the Society had many distinguished visitors, amongst them the Governor of Malta, The Presidents of the Republic of Malta and Church Dignities




