Fr. Fred Farrugia Adelaide-Australia Bringing Jesus back to Christmas

Archbishop Charles Scicluna marked the 50th anniversary of Malta becoming a Republic by addressing the country's declining fertility rate and questioned who would "represent Malta's identity and fly our national colours" when his generation dies.

Delivering a homily at St John's Co-Cathedral, Scicluna recalled how in 1964, the year Malta gained Independence, Malta's birth rate was 2.74. In 1974, when Malta became a Republic, it was 2.08.

Now, in 2024, Malta has the lowest fertility rate in the EU, with a birth rate of 1.08. Experts forecast that the already low fertility rate will continue to shrink in the years to come.

"Malta's current birth rate is so low, that it is below replacement level," Scicluna said.

"We need to think about the roots and causes of this downward trend, and in the interest of our heritage and the preservation of our ethnicity, we need to be proactive in promoting the blessing of offspring to our families." He prayed to God to grant Malta the "blessing of new births in our beloved and sweet land".

Mgr. Scicluna noted how this year's budget has tried to address the issue and encourage young couples to plan their future and fulfil their "natural vocation" to become mothers and fathers of the country's future generations.

This year's budget - among other measures - includes a €1,500 one-time payment for the third and every subsequent child, a boost in marriage tax credit and a €250 increase in child allowance. Scicluna said measures such as providing fair wages and affordable housing would encourage families to thrive and grow.

"For what would the Republic have achieved if it makes economic progress and reforms its institutions but does not provide for the gift of future generations," he asked.

"Who will be there to represent Malta's identity and fly our national colours when our generation fades away? Who will be there to proudly declare this island as a sweet homeland that cherishes its identity and serves as a haven for the life and love and its people?"

He concluded his homily by appealing to the people to pray that the future descendants will be there when the time comes "for us to hand over the baton".

Scicluna also expressed gratitude for the country's achievements over the past 50 years and paid tribute to contributions by politicians, public servants, judiciary, army and law enforcement.

During advent, the figures would be carefully taken from their wrapping and set up in the church to tell the story of the birth of Christ with Baby Jesus being placed in the manger during midnight Mass. Soon after the feast of the Epiphany, the crib would be dismantled, the individual pieces gently rewrapped and placed in storage ready for next Christmas.

Fr Fred Farrugia painstakingly restoring the nativity set statues.

The set found itself homeless during chapel renovations and the figures, including Joseph, Mary and an angel, ended up in disrepair and gathering dust in a parishioner's garage. Two decades later, in 2023, Fr Fred was contacted with a query about how to appropriately dispose of statues that have been blessed but are no longer wanted. When he looked at the badly damaged set, he saw potential. "It was a disaster. They were broken and scratched," Fr Fred said.

"But it's a beautiful set. I had never seen this kind before."

Originally from Malta, Fr Fred devotes Monday afternoons to painting and carpentry. He paints using acrylics, with Dolly, his little West Highland White Terrier, watching on.

"Some of them took a long time to fix but thank God, nothing was lost," he said.

"All the pieces were there but they had a lot of scratches and breaks. I used plaster to fix them then painted them."

This isn't Fr Fred's first foray into ambitious creative projects. He also renovated Stations of the Cross and made a miniature replica of his church back at home in Malta. The tiny church is full of intricate detail and takes pride of place in his home.

"When I first came to South Australia I was based in Noarlunga," Fr Fred said.

"It was a bit difficult until I got used to life in Australia so that's when I started making it."

Fr Fred hopes the new-look nativity scene will bring joy to parishioners. It will be on display at St Matthew's in Bridgewater this Christmas.

"We haven't fully recovered from COVID and people not being able to go to church," he said. "Some families didn't come back. My message for this time of year is let's bring Jesus back to Christmas. We lose that when it all becomes too commercial."

Been a while since I've been in contact with you, hope you're in the best of health.

Dr. BARRY YORK (MEILAK) FROM AUSTRALIA SHARES ONE OF HIS STORIES WITH US

My late uncle Joe Meilak (1904-1988), my dad's brother, emigrated to Melbourne from Malta a century ago, in December 1924. He worked on the waterfront for 44 years and nominated my parents and me as assisted migrants in 1954.

On a visit to Melbourne in November, my wife and daughter and I were able to visit the former house of Uncle Joe and his Australian wife Daisy in Hawke Street, West Melbourne. It was the first accommodation in Australia for mum and dad and me.

Joe and Daisy put up quite a few new arrivals there. Earlier this year, I wrote to the current owners and they kindly arranged for us to visit.

It's hard to believe that in such a small space in 1954 there were ten of us: Daisy and Joe and their three adult children, plus mum, dad and me, plus a Maltese wharfie mate of Joe's (known as Kurun) and another new arrival, a cousin named Lou Meilak.

Joe and Daisy were wonderful people: members of the working class 'battler' generation from whom we can learn so much in terms of human values.

I'm pleased that I recorded oral history interviews with them both in 1984. I am forever grateful for their sponsorship of my parents and me, and for their kindness and generosity in providing our initial accommodation in Australia.

Postscript: Also while in Melbourne, I was awarded the prestigious Hazel de Berg Award for Excellence in Oral History at the biennial conference of the Oral History Association of Australia.

CHRISTMAS MESSAGE THE DISCOVERY OF THE MAN'S DIGNITY

Msgr. George Frendo O.P. Archbishop Emeritus of Tirana-Durres

If Christmas is the mystery which reveals the true face of God, it is also the mystery which reveals the true face of man. It celebrates man because it emphasizes the irreplaceable

dignity of man for whom God adopted humanity and its frailty. In the Christmas liturgy we read an exquisite invocation from St. Leo the Great: "O Christian, be aware of your dignity". One could change this expression to make it read thus: "O man, be aware of your dignity". Christmas manifests the dignity of man, of each and every man. This dignity is revealed in a child, the God in search of man who has become man, a baby, totally dependent on others. Luke writes about the birth of Christ as taking place away from home and in unusual circumstances.

It happens in a cave and in extreme poverty while a population census is going on. In a census, man is but a number, one immersed in and lost among the masses. Who could be aware of what had taken place in that cave in Bethlehem? Jesus was born in a census. He is just a number. On the other hand, he is born into a small but friendly community of two persons, Mary and Joseph. Mary is the new Ark. She carried within her, not the rolls of the law, like the Ark built by Moses, but the author of a new covenant. She is the symbol of all those who, with faith and simplicity, receive Christ who has loved the Church, his spouse. She is the symbol of all the men who truly love their wives and dedicate themselves wholehearted to the well-being of their children.

The presence of the shepherds, an emarginated group, anticipate Christ's prayer: "I bless you, Father, Lord of heaven and of earth, for hiding these things from the learned and the clever and revealing them to mere children" (Mt 11, 25). The child Jesus is not revealed to Herod or the High Priests, but to the Bethlehem shepherds who left behind them their sheep, their only "treasure", to accept the invitation to meet Jesus, the God who made the first step to reconcile man with God. Thus, the cave at Bethlehem became the first Church where Jesus is adored in Spirit and Truth by people who had nothing to offer but themselves. By becoming one of us, the Word Incarnate has revealed to us our dignity.**To the Editor and readers of the Maltese Journal - May the glory of our Savior's birth fill your heart with peace and love this Christmas and throughout the approaching New Year 2025.**

I really wish that this journal keeps on going so that Maltese living abroad will still cherish the culture and heritage of the Maltese islands. A real blessed happy Christmas to all the readers.

On behalf of my family and my colleagues at the Consulate, I wish each of you a very Merry Christmas and a New Year filled with good health, happiness, and success.







THANK YOU, FRANK I thank you for sending me your journal for Maltese Living Abroad -THE MALTESE E- NEWSLETTER. In the edition number 542, I read with great interest about the Maltese Community Council of South Australia, the award of the George Cross to the Island of



Malta during World War 2 and the ANZAC and the GEORGE CROSS monuments at Prospect Garden, SA. These monuments are hardly visited by the members of the Maltese community because since the dissolution of the RSL Maltese Branch many Maltese forgot or don't know about them. You may find these monuments near the North Adelaide Football ground at Menzies Street, Prospect, SA

As Maltes-Australian citizen I am proud of my contribution I gave to the Maltese community for these last 70 years. I was also involved in the Malta United soccer team in the 50s and 70s. The club used to be situated at Waymouth Street, Adelaide and the late Salvu Zammit and his partner used to provide the players with

coffee and pastizzi. They were the only ones who used to sell pastizzi in Adelaie. I was also a committee member of several associations in South Australia and especially on the committee of the Malta Anzac Memorial which was built at the Botanic Gardens Floriana Malta by the late Mr Nicholas Bonello, former High Commissioner for Malta in Australia.




THE RETIRED MALTESE CHAPLAIN Fr. Gabriel Stephen Micallef OFM

I think that in Adelaide, in South Australia there are individuals who know how to the Maltese celebrate Christmas in Australia much better than me. It was the late Fr. Peter Paul Mejlaq OFM who built the first crib in the garden of the house of the Franciscan Friars on Henley Beach

Road which was next to the Lockleys Church, The church is dedicated to Christ the King. This was the church built mainly by the Maltese Migrants in the 40s and 50s and was also the church and the centre of the Maltese community. The Friars were given a historic house next to the church with a very large and beautiful garden where the first Franciscan fathers lived for many years. It is worth mentioning the pioneers- Fr. Giles Ferriggi, Fr. Pietru Pawl Mejlaq and Fr. Sebastjan Camilleri. Father Egidju (Giles) was in charge of building of the Church and was the first parish priest of this parish, he also built the school of "St. Francis" adjacent to the Church. Fr. Peter Paul was the Maltese Chaplain. There were many Maltese who were baptised, confirmed or married or had their funeral Mass in this church. With the arrival of the members of the MUSEUM, the devotion to Baby Jesus began to spread. P. Pietru Pawl with the help of some Maltese volunteers built a hut in a corner of the garden. Here he made the shepherds and other small statues or *pasture* as we Maltese know them, while the members of the Museum took care of organizing on Christmas eve the procession with the Child Jesus, with some children carrying the lanterns. The Franciscan Sisters of the Heart of Jesus whose convent was nearby took care of the singing of the Christmas carols. A Christmas used to be held in the garden of the convent and a child used to deliver the sermon during Mass.

This devotion was still maintained until a few years ago especially when the I, the last Maltese Champlain went back to Malta to retire. Some nearby parishes introduced this custom that has been carried out to this day and is attended by many Catholics, mostly Italians.

I wish all readers of this Journal and all Maltese emigrants and their families a Merry Christmas and a blessed New Year 2025. THANK YOU, FRANK

BETHLEHEM F'GHAJNSIELEM

This is a life-sized crib spread over 20,000sqm of fields situated adjacent to the popular Ghajnsielem Square. This nativity village is always open but is usually animated on a handful of dates throughout December and at the start of January, when more than 150 actors give you a glimpse of life in Judea of 2000 years ago. You'll also get to see and pet animals that are synonymous with the Christmas crib. There will also be several workshops open and plenty an opportunity to enjoy a warm glass of mulled wine or a Gozitan snack from the bakery. CHRISTMAS CONCERTS

If you love Christmas songs, then you're in for a treat if you book a stay in Gozo throughout this festive period. There are over 25 Christmas concerts planned between now and the end of the programme at the start of January 2025 with the main ones being Christmas it's Time, Carolling Christmas Concert, Feel the Magic of Christmas, and the Leone Grand Christmas Concert. CHRISTMAS MIDNIGHT MASS IN GOZO

The Christmas highlight for many locals is the midnight mass that is held in each village church on the island. The vigil usually starts at about 11.30pm on Christmas eve and is accompanied by live music to celebrate the birth of Baby Jesus. In Victoria, midnight mass is magnificently celebrated at St. George's Basilica and the Gozo Cathedral, but you need to be early to secure a chair as these services are usually very popular. There are also other churches around TH that celebrate midnight mass with St. Francis Church, just up the road from our B&B, a worthy mention. During the midnight mass it is an old local tradition for a parish child, usually about 10 years old, to deliver the Christmas message to the congregation.

ITALIANS, INDIANS LARGEST GROUPS GRADUATING AT TERTIARY LEVEL UNIVERSITY OF MALTA

Italians and Indians made up the bulk of foreign students who graduated at tertiary level from

Maltese institutions in 2023, official figures show.

The National Statistics Office last week said 5,833 students graduated at tertiary level in 2023 with a quarter of them being foreigners. From the 1,526 foreign students, 428 were Italians and 424 were Indians.

A breakdown of the statistics by citizenship shows that 4,307 graduates were Maltese, 694 came from other EU countries and 832 hailed from non-EU countries.

Italian graduates in 2023 increased by 2.9% over the previous year, making them by far the largest cohort of EU students to obtain a tertiary degree in Malta. Interestingly, the number of Italian graduates stood at just 143 in 2021.

The second largest cohort of EU graduates came from Germany with 115 students obtaining a tertiary degree in Malta. However, this represented a decrease of 42.8% over the previous year but was still substantially higher than 2021 when only 14 German students graduated in Malta.

Indians were by far the largest cohort of non-EU nationals to obtain a tertiary degree in Malta. In 2023, 424 Indians graduated, representing a 165% increase over the previous year when just 160 obtained a tertiary degree. The next largest cohort was British students with 37 graduating from Maltese tertiary institutions in 2023, an increase of 10 over the previous year. American students came a close third with 34 obtaining a tertiary degree in Malta. This represented an increase of 20 students over 2022.

The NSO figures also show that most foreign nationals irrespective of whether they hail from the EU or not, graduated at tertiary level in 'health and welfare' areas of study. A relative majority of Maltese graduates obtained degrees in 'business, administration and law'.

While 31.6% of Maltese obtained tertiary level qualifications in 'business, administration and law', 13.3% did so in 'health and welfare' and 13.1% in 'education'. By contrast, 46.1% EU nationals who graduated from Maltese institutions did so in 'health and welfare', followed by 21% in 'business, administration and law'. Among non-EU nationals, 55.2% graduated at tertiary level in 'health and welfare', followed by 27.3% in 'business, administration and law'.

The statistics took into consideration students who attended formal education programmes at tertiary level delivered in Malta, whether online or face-to-face, with a minimum duration of one semester of full-time study, or equivalent in part-time.

The largest share of tertiary graduates (52.5%) attained a qualification at ISCED Level 6 (Bachelor's degree or equivalent). This was followed by 34.9% of total tertiary graduates who attained a qualification at ISCED Level 7 (Master's or equivalent).

The majority of graduates in ISCED levels 6 (Bachelor's or equivalent) and 7 (Master's or equivalent) were Maltese (81.1% and 77.5% respectively), whilst in ISCED levels 5 (Short-cycle tertiary education) and 8 (Doctoral or equivalent), the majority of graduates were foreign nationals (67.8% and 60.3% respectively).


