

The Malta High Commissioner in Australia, Mr Mario Farrugia Borg (top left), met with the Australian members of the Council of Maltese Living Abroad (CMLA), with whom he discussed how to serve better the needs of the Maltese in Australia. Every delegate of the Council is committed to making such meetings happen regularly, as will other meetings with representatives of various Maltese entities, in keeping

with an open-door policy and ensuring total access to the Maltese diaspora.

The Council was set up by the Government of Malta in 2011. Following the Convention of Maltese Living Abroad held in March 2010, the Government of Malta published a draft Bill proposing to set up a Council for Maltese Living Abroad and the establishment of a Maltese Cultural Institute. The Council is made up of a group of persons selected by the Prime Minister after taking into consideration the organisational set up of the Maltese communities overseas together with another group of persons living in Malta who are versed in matters relating to Maltese living abroad. The Council is chaired by the Minister of Foreign Affairs and has most of its members from overseas.

This journal, which is published weekly and is the mouthpiece of all Maltese living overseas, is complementary to the Council and has similar aims and objectives. i.e., to protect and promote the rights of all Maltese living abroad whilst also increasing interest in Maltese language, culture, heritage and identity. It serves as the focal point for information, advice, cooperation and co-ordination to Maltese citizens living in other parts of the world.

This journal endeavour to promotes the activities and functions of all associations and clubs of Maltese communities operating in and outside Malta and maintain strong communication links with the Council of the Maltese Living Abroad. Our journal is also included on the website of the Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs. Working together benefits the members of the Maltese Diaspora. Our journal is open to the Council and all its delegates.



Malta National Day Celebrations in Paris



On 23 September 2021, the Embassy of Malta in France celebrated the 57th anniversary of Malta's Independence. On this occasion, the Embassy organised a concert at the Town Hall of the 8th District of Paris, 'Mélodies françaises, airs d'opéra et surprises maltaises' by soprano Johanna Cassar, accompanied by musicians Louis Rodde on the violincello, and Marion Lénart, on the harp. In his opening address, Ambassador Carmelo Inguanez reaffirmed the good relations which exists between Malta and France, while referring to Malta's Mediterranean and European vocation. Present for this event were the Mayor of the 8th district of Paris, Ms Jeanne d'Hauteserre; the Chairman of the Select Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Armed Forces at the French Senate, Senator Christian Cambon; the Secretary General of the French Presidency of the European Union, Ambassador Xavier Lapeyre de Cabanes; Ambassadors and members of the diplomatic community in Paris lead by the Dean of Diplomatic Corps. H.E. Mgr. Celestini Migliore; the Honorary

Malta National Day in Abu Dhabi, UAE



On 20 September 2021, the Embassy of the Republic of Malta in the United Arab Emirates opened the diplomatic season with the celebration of the 57th Anniversary of Malta's Independence. The event was enriched with the auspicious presence of His Highness Sheikh Sager Bin Mohammed Al Qasimi of the Royal Court of Sharjah, Excellency Dr Abdullah Bin Mohamed Belhaif Al Nuaimi, UAE Minister of Climate Change Environment, and the Honourable Dr. Aaron Farrugia, Minister for Environment, Climate Change and

Planning. The diplomatic and commercial communities, government officials, agencies, authorities and members of the Maltese community were among guests attending the event hosted by the Ambassador of the Republic of Malta to the UAE, H.E. Maria Camilleri Calleja, who thanked the sponsors for their support. Maltese Soprano Nicola Said and pianist Giuliano Mazzoccante gave an impeccable rendering of the Maltese and Emirati National Anthems and sang various Arias giving an added value and class to the event. This was the first large-scale event to be held in Abu Dhabi with the support of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation of the United Arab Emirates and the Abu Dhabi Department of Culture and Tourism. CHILD MIGRSNTS' PROJECT

In 1928 Perth-based Maltese priest Raphael Pace urged the Roman Catholic Brothers to include Maltese children in its emerging migration scheme. Negotiations between the Maltese and Western Australian Governments continued through the 1930s but the first Maltese child migrants did not arrive in Australia until after World War II.

Between 1950 and 1965, 259 boys and 51 girls were sent to Catholic institutions in Western Australia and South Australia.

Most parents believed their children would receive a better education in Australia. Instead many were put to work on the Christian Brothers' building projects and left to endure the same punishments and abuses as their British counterparts. Some were forced to stop using their Maltese language and never learned to read or write English.

MALTESE CANADIAN COMMUNITY NEWS *Travel update if you are travelling within Canada or departing Canada to go abroad

VACCINE REQUIREMENTS FOR TRAVELLERS

Effective October 30, air passengers departing from Canadian airports, travellers on VIA Rail and Rocky Mountaineer trains, and travellers on non-essential passenger vessels on voyages of 24 hours or more, such as cruise ships, will need to be vaccinated.

Effective October 30, travellers will need to be fully vaccinated in order to board. Specifically, the vaccination requirement will apply to all travellers 12 years of age and older who are:

Air passengers flying on domestic, transborder or international flights departing from airports in Canada

Rail passengers on VIA Rail and Rocky Mountaineer trains

Marine passengers on non-essential passenger vessels, such as cruise ships, on voyages of 24 hours or more.



For travellers who are in the process of being vaccinated, there will be a short transition period where they will be able to travel if they can show a valid COVID-19 molecular test within 72 hours of travel. By November 30, all travellers must be fully vaccinated, with very limited exceptions to address specific situations such as

emergency travel, and those medically unable to be vaccinated."

Malta Day Canada 2021

The Consul General of Republic of Malta to Canada, Dr Raymond C. Xerri presided over seven events of Malta Day Canada 2021 to mark the 57th Anniversary of Malta's Independence. These events took place on Saturday, 18th and Sunday, 19th September 2021 starting on Saturday evening with two Maltese Citizenship Certificate Ceremonies at the Maltese Canadian Museum, Archives and Visitation Centre at St Paul the Apostle Maltese Canadian Parish Auditorium, in Toronto, Canada.

The ceremonies commenced with a prayer by Assistant Pastor, Fr Ivano Burdian MSSP followed by a few words

delivered by Joe Sherri, President of the Maltese Canadian Federation. Consul General of the Republic of Malta to Canada, Dr Raymond Xerri then distributed all the Maltese Citizenship Certificates to recipients and concluded each ceremony with a speech, highlighting the privileges of having obtaining a European passport.



On Sunday morning commenced with the traditional Flag Raising Ceremony at Malta Park, located in Malta Village, City of Toronto, Province of Ontario in Canada. The Ceremony commenced with a prayer by Fr Giovann Tabone MSSP and the President of the Maltese Canadian Federation, Joe Sherri delivered a few words emphasizing the importance of Maltese community unity and solidarity. Then, Federation President Sherri raised the Canadian flag and Consul General Dr Xerri raised the Maltese flag whilst both national anthems were song by Maltese violinist James Zammit.

This ceremony ended with the traditional annual speech delivered by the Consul General, Dr Xerri who stated, "Dear Maltese Canadians – I can comfortably hold my head high and speak with pride about the very good life you have managed to create for yourselves and your families here in Canada ... Malta is proud of your extraordinary achievements ... you are exemplary citizens and ambassadors of both Malta and Canada." The Federation, two clubs and a number of associations attended with their respective flags or banners.

Immediately after the Flag Raising Ceremony, all present attended the traditional Maltese Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving at the St Paul The Apostle Maltese Canadian Church, to mark the 57th Anniversary of Malta's Independence celebrated by Fr Giovann Tabone MSSP.

At the beginning of the Mass, Dr Raymond C. Xerri, Consul General of the Republic of Malta to Canada lead a procession of the community leaders with flags and banners to the altar where he presented a bouquet of flowers to the parish. After mass, Dr Xerri delivered another speech where he emphasized the importance to support all that is Maltese in Canada to be able to transmit Maltese culture to our future Maltese Canadian generations.

After Mass, Consul General Dr Xerri in the presence of Pastor Giovann Tabone MSSP officially inaugurated three exhibitions; 'Portraits of Prominent Maltese,' a 64 photographic-portrait exhibition of presidents and prime ministers of Malta, judges, authors, actors, people of sports, artists, comedians and other categories. All the portraits are photographed by renowned Maltese photographer, Tony S. Mangion.

The second exhibition was, 'Traditional Maltese Wicker Tools' – an exhibition of 11 very different Maltese and Gozitan traditional wicker tools which are no longer used by Malta's population today, mostly replaced by plastic and steel items. It consisted of a wicker-bottle for olive and/or vinegar, hay wicker basket, Gozitan fisherman's Pot, fishmonger's wicker, grape wicker basket, fruit and vegetable wicker basket, egg wicker basket, wool and sick bobbin wicker basket and a robust wicker basket.

The third exhibition; 'Traditional Maltese Balconies' by Maltese Canadian, Michael Andrew Camilleri consisted of a number of miniture Maltese traditional balcones of different designs and colours expressing the craftsmanship of Mr Camilleri.

Bags stocked with traditional Maltese food and drink was the cherry on that day's cake! A very much welcomed idea by all. Pastizzi, qassatat, imqaret, honey rings, kinnie, galletti, kunserva and more in the absence of a reception due to COVID19 restrictions. This traditional food reminds us that this food is ours, therefore special for us, its gives a sense of one community, one identity, one people and one nation – Malta and Gozo.

In the evening an additional two Maltese Citizenship Ceremonies were organised on the same format as the ones organised the previous day. Due to COVID19 restrictions, only 100 out of 750 Maltese Citizenship Certificate recipients could attend one of the four ceremonies.

All the above events were made possible thanks to funding provided by the Ministry for Foreign & European Affairs, the National Archivist of Malta, photographer Tony S. Mangion, violinist James Zammt, Michael Andrew Camilleri, the Maltese traditional foods stores in Toronto and the Governing Board of the Maltese Canadian Museum, Archives and Visitation Centre.

Consul General Dr Xerri whole heartedly thanked the Consulate staff, the many volunteers of the St Paul The Apostle Maltese Canadian Parish Church for their cooperation in making the events of Malta Day Canada 2021 a success story.

Turin to host next year's Eurovision Song Contest

This will be the first Eurovision Song Contest to be held in Italy in 30 years. The dates

-The national public broadcasting company of Italy RAI has made a decision that the next Eurovision Song Contest will be held in the city of Turin.


The 66th edition of the festival will be held in

the PalaOlimpico stadium on Tuesday 10th, Thursday 12th and Saturday 14th May 2022. Italy won this year's edition with Maneskin and their song Zitti e buoni. Malta came in seventh place with the song Je Me Casse performed by Destiny.

Turin beat off competition from having triumphed over 16 other competing bids, including Milan, Bologna, Rimini and Pesaro to host the event.

There is currently some speculation about the presenters of the Eurovision Song Contest in Italy will be. Singer Mika, most well-known for his song Grace Kelly, is one of the rumoured possible presenters but there has been no official conformation as yet.

Eurovision Song Contest Executive Supervisor Martin Österdahl said, "Turin is the perfect Host City for the 66th Eurovision Song Contest. As we saw during the 2006 Winter Olympics, PalaOlimpico exceeds all the requirements needed to stage a global event of this scale and we have been very impressed with the enthusiasm and commitment from the City of Turin who will welcome thousands of fans next May. This will be the first Eurovision Song Contest to be held in Italy in 30 years and, together with our Host broadcaster Rai, we are determined to make it a special one."

We dedicate a lot of time and energy and a great deal of our financial resources to keeping the chapel in its original

state and splendor. Excepting the last 18 months during the Covid-19 pandemic, the ALPS celebrates Holy Mass at this Pwales Chapel quasi every month of the year. In July, we also organize and celebrate the Festa Sant Anna for whom this chapel is dedicated. Members come in great numbers with family and friends to spend a wonderful evening with ALPS

We generally organize this feast on the first Saturday in the month of July each year. After mass which is held on the zuntier overlooking the fields and, to the sound of Ilma Gieri filling the large giebja just under the chapel parvis, one can sit and celebrate Holy Mass, to the sound of chirping birds, il-hoss tal-werzieq fis-sajf Malti I-ghodda talghelieqi kif ukoll xi ghajta ta'xi moghza jew xi hmar gewwa I-ghorfa fil-vicin. The farmers from the surrounding fields bring along 'bettieh u dullieh' to distribute to the congregation and who never stop thanking them for letting them taste the produce

from the Pwales fields.It is the ALPS mission to continue to look after the Pwales Chapel. We want to bequeath to a future generation this old chapel, in a good state and with a much of its originality as best we can.

The Association of Past Students (ALPS) celebrates annually the feast of Saint Anne at the Chapel in the middle of Pwales valley, St Pauls's Bay. For readers who do not know where this chapel is situated, it is approximately one kilometer inlandfrom Xemxija Bay.

A Brief History of the Chapel

This small chapel was built in the late sixteenth century as a jus patronat by the landowner of the fields of the Pwales valley, the Sant Fournier family and it fell under the jurisdiction of the Naxxar Parish Priest. A documentdated 1799 asserting the Naxxar jurisdiction lies in the archives of ALPS.

When Saint Paul's Bay church was built by the dowager Marchesa Bugeja and the curja architect drew the outlines of the parish of Saint Paul's Bay, the Pwales valley was separated from Naxxar parish and transferred

to the new one. The Conventual Friars took over possession of Saint Paul's Bay parish and the Chapel of Saint Anne too. They established that the feast day of Saint Anne should always be the Saturday preceding the feast of Our Lady of Sorrows as celebrated by them in the parish. Therefore, the feast day of Saint Anne is celebrated on the first Saturday of July. Since the year 2000, ALPS have taken under their care, the upkeep and use of the Pwales Chapel.

This was made possible through their spiritual director Fr. William Bartolo a Conventual friar. Holy mass is celebrated nearly every month. Many members with their families and friends as well as theresidents from the Pwales hamlet turn up for such function to hear mass by the same Fr. William who delivers exceptionally interesting sermons.



FESTA SANT ANNA AT PWALES

ALPS Council Members, take the preparations for the feast rather seriously and a whole programme of activities is planned during the year, so that all members and the Pwales residents will enjoy a typical Maltese festa.

When the feast approaches the chapel is cleaned of all shrubs by the Lyceum Scouts group whilst ALPS members prepare the electricity lights running along the pathway. After a thorough cleaning of the cangatura flooring, the pews are polished even though not used, as the ceremony takes place on the church parvis.

Close to two hundred people attend this year's each year for the Holy Mass celebrated by the Saint Paul's Bay parish priest Father Michael Attard while the Voices of Faith Choir is directed by Veronique Degabriele Ferrante, the daughter of ALPS council member Mr. Robert Ferrante. During last year's festa we had the inauguration of a new bell donated by Mrs. Dolores Dimech, a parishioner. It could be heard ringing before this year's Holy Mass when the people come up the hill to attend for the festa. At the end of the ceremony, the evening follows the presentation of two young children to Saint Anne. This is the second year in succession that children of the Pwales community have been presented to the Patron Sant' Anna.

Normally the president of ALPS delivers a speech and appealed to all who were present to assist the association. A collection was made during the feast that now goes towards the necessary maintenance works on the Chapel. It bears to mention that a relative of ALPS member Peter Tortell donated various raw materials that shall be required for this restoration.

At the end of the religious ceremony light refreshments courtesy of ALPS and prepared by the committee and some wives of ALPS officials, were later served to all present. Traditionally, the residents of the Pwales community provided complimentary fresh fruit grown in the area and a very enjoyable fireworks display from their fieldsthat are situated just under the chapel parvis.

Connie and her brother Joe Borg started a Maltese Language program on PBAFRM on Saturday 28 January 1983 at the Education Centre, Salisbury. They called it BLUE GROTTO MALTESE PROGRAM.

For all these years Connie broadcasted this program every Saturday AT 11.00 AM without fail until 2019. The program was very popular and well-received by the members of the Maltese community. It contained news from Malta, cultural and religious items, sports, and Maltese traditional music. She kept the Maltese associations informed and connected.

Connie had several helpers who volunteered to participate in her program. Connie was also interested in Maltese Language and in the 8o's she asked me to start a Maltese Language school for the residents of the Maltese in the Northern region. The school was approved and supported by the Education Department of South Australia and was well-attended


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Oreste L. Aquilina JP foundation member and Secretary of the Association of Lyceum Past Students NSW Branch, was born in Siggiew.Malta. After attending The Lyceum from 1950 to 1955 and completing his GCEs. he worked for the Water & Electricity Department for about 10 months as a clerk-typist before emigrating to Australia in 1956. He obtained a Personnel management certificate in 1977 and over the years during his employment with the Australian Government Departments (Postmaster General's Department, Primary Industry and Defence-Navy) he undertook a number of finance and administrative courses. He was awarded the Department of Defence 30 years' service medal and retired from the Australian public service after 40 years. From 1980 he worked part-time as freelance interpreter and Special Broadcasting Service TV subtitler, working on such features and episodes as Is-Salib tal-Wied, II-Hadd fug il-Bejt, In-Neputija tal-Kappillan, Il-Kap Jien Tikkmanda Hi, Operation White Dove, Trig Wahda, Issa Naraw, Mera tal-Passat, Ipokriti and others. He was also a part-time broadcaster on SBS Radio and the Maltese Community Council 2SER FM program.

Oreste certainly kept himself very busy with extracurricular activities. From an early age he was interested in welfare, and before emigrating to Australia he was on the executive of the Siggiewi branch of the Young Christian Workers (ZHN). In Australia in the early 1960s he was a member of the Catholic Youth Organisation, President of the Stella Maris Club and later became President of the Maltese Guild of Australia (where he initiated the move for dual citizenship for the Maltese living in Australia), as well as holding other executive positions. He was Secretary and Treasurer of the Maltese Community Council of NSW and the originator, driving force and Chairman of the Australian-Maltese Bicentennial Commemorative Memorial (AMBCM) that built the bicentennial Memorial at Pendle Hill (a project funded by the Governments of Malta and NSW, Holroyd Council, Maltese associations and public donations). He was Secretary of the United Council of Immigrants (initiating the teaching of foreign languages in schools and lobbying for reduction to 10 years for eligibility and transferability of pensions), co-founder of the St Nicholas Festa Committee and President for some 18 years, until 1997. He was a founding member of the Maltese Cultural Group and the only non-playing President of Our Lady Queen of Peace Parish Band at Greystanes. Besides being a life member of the Catholic Club, he is an honorary member of the South Sydney Juniors Rugby League Club and an Honorary President of the St Nicholas Festa Committee. Since retirement he became more involved in choral music, and is a member of the Beethoven Society of Australia, Macquarie University Singers, Sydney Philharmonia, Manly-Warringah Society and other choirs.

Oreste is recognised by the National Accreditation Authority of Translators and Interpreters and is a Justice of the Peace for the State of NSW. His hobbies include choral singing (he sang with Pavarotti in Stockholm in June 1999), occasional painting and computer surfing, besides following basketball and doing some reading, particularly in Maltese.

St Roque Chapel in Żebbug, Malta

A familiar sight to people from her village, the woman's presence has been immortalised in one of a series of photographs taken to celebrate the chapels of Malta and Gozo.

The photos, taken by Enrico Formica, were published in a series of books about the islands' chapels on the initiative of Eddie Aquilina, known for the "360 Degree" book collection that contain spectacular scenes of Malta and Gozo.

Mr Aquilina's passion for churches and feasts inspired him

to turn the lens onto the chapels that sometimes go unnoticed and draw people's attention to the hard work that goes behind maintaining these architectural gems.

"There are so many volunteers and entire families involved in helping out with these chapels. I didn't want to take photos of closed chapels. I wanted them to be alive and involve the real people who look after them," Mr Aquilina said.

"The help I found from these people is tremendous as they tried to accommodate me... For me, this is a labour of love... It's so satisfying because I'm building a library that will not date," he said.

There are over 280 chapels in Malta and Gozo and organising each chapel for a shoot takes lots of work. Mr Aqulilina explained that he usually started by contacting the parish priest who told him who held the keys to a particular chapel.

Like a treasure hunt, he then contacted those people and they visited the place together to determine the best time of day for the shoot. Sometimes he even contacted neighbours to ask them to move cars or open windows on the day of the shoot for a perfect backdrop.

"This has created a healthy pique... They want their chapel to look good and be in the book... As I've said before, this island is an open air museum," Mr Aquilina said. Throughout his experience working on the books, he met many amazing people and came across amusing situations. When shooting St Anne's chapel, in Pwales, he learnt the power of nature's clock. He wanted an early afternoon photo of a farmer, Toni, with his sheep near the chapel.

"When I told him I wanted to take the photo at about 3 p.m., with a heavy accent he told me: 'Do you eat at all times of day? Do you think you can take out sheep anytime? It's either at 9 a.m. or the evening... You can't dictate to sheep what time to go out grazing... I can try to help but you make arrangements with the sun to come out when you want it to'," Mr Aquilina recalled in amusement.

When the day of the photo arrived, the farmer managed to get the sheep out a bit earlier that evening. He warned the photographer not to make sudden noises or movements that would startle the sheep.

When photographing St Peter's chapel in Lija, located near an old people's home, the nuns there brought out the elderly to sit on benches and animate the road.



Schoolchildren, wearing their uniforms, gathered outside St Anne in Attard to play football for the occasion and, in Dingli, the parish priest gathered young people on the parvis for an outdoor sermon. In another amusing anecdote, while at the Marsascala chapel of St Antonio, the dog of a nearby farmer decided to turn up for the photo. "When we were about to take the photo he started moving around. It took about 15 minutes to get him to calm down.

"Suddenly he found this position," Mr Aqulina

The Queen recognises Maltese environmentalist's efforts to clean up beaches

Mark Galea Pace has taken it upon himself to clean up Malta's beaches.

Environmental activist Mark Galea Pace has been recognised by the Queen as the Commonwealth Point of Light winner, representing Malta.

The recognition is in honour of his "exceptional voluntary service" in promoting environmental awareness and managing areas of natural and scientific interest.

Galea Pace is a fitness instructor who set out on a <u>solo three-day boat trip</u> cleaning beaches and raising awareness about marine litter polluting

the sea.Raising money for Nature Trust Malta, Mark collected <u>52 bags</u> and 20 jerry cans full of rubbish on his trip.He has since embarked on additional solo clean-ups around the island, inspiring large groups of volunteers in Malta to kayak around the archipelago and gather rubbish from the sea and beaches, Points of Light said in a statement.

British High Commissioner to Malta Katherine Ward said that Galea Pace's solo, tree-day kayaking journey around Malta demonstrated the impact one person can have.

"That he continues to inspire others to take action in the here and now to save our planet is a testament to his efforts."

Galea Pace said he wanted to use his strength and fitness as an ex-waterpolo player to inspire people to take action and bring about change.

"Whether alone or with a handful of volunteers, I will remain determined to search and collect, week in week out, as much plastic and fishing debris from our coastline and seas, because marine life does not get a break from the litter we leave behind that threatens their survival," he said.



The Simshar tragedy

Many have perished while fishing but the Simshar story will remain unforgotten as it is one with the most victims since two centuries. On the 7th of July 2008 Karmnu Bugeja a 61 year old was preparing for the usual fishing trip with his 31 year old son Simon. The boat a brand new 43 footer and fully equipped with

modern technological fishing equipment left the picturesque village of Marsaxlokk. With them were Abdulrahman Abdala Gedi a 21 year old Somali, Noel Carabott a 33 year old and Simon's 11 year old son Theo Bugeja.

Two days after departing Simon contacted his wife Sharon asking her for the weather forecast of the island of Lampedusa. She asked about Theo as this was his first long fishing trip. The next day Simshar sent its position. The boat had to return after five days of fishing.

The wifes of both Simon and Noel started to worry when on Saturday they still had not returned. They contacted the Malta Armed Forces, and these started their search with a small plane. It was to no avail trying to contact the boat as they never had any answer back. The Italian Navy was also

contacted and these sent a Guardia Costiera and a helicopter in search of the missing boat. The Armed Forces of Malta sent another helicopter and a patrol boat. Twenty fishing boats with sixty fishermen also joined the search.

Three days later fishing boat Laura 2 found the body of Noel Carabott. On Friday 18th July the helicopter spotted another body and the fishing boat Madonna Tal Karmnu lifted this body. It was the body of Karmenu Bugeja. A few hours later Simon was found still alive by another fishing vessel. This same boat found the body of Gedi the next day. Simon was found 68 miles out of the port of Marsaxlokk and 30 miles away from where Simon said the Simshar had exploded.

Simon had told his rescuers that Theo was with him and was still alive. He had even tied some fishing floats around him to keep him from sinking.

After medical attention Simon gave his story of what had happened on the 10th of July and said that the boat was about seventy miles to the west of Malta and was due back towards Malta. There was a strange sound coming from the engine room and suddenly the boat exploded and all the fishermen were blown into the sea. They clung to floating debris as the boat sank immediately. One by one all started drowning. Gedi was the first followed by Noel and the Karmnu. Theo slipped from his hands but was still alive according to Simon.

Explosion at St Helen's Fireworks Factory

On the 27th of June 2007 around 5.45pm started a series of explosions which totally leveled the fireworks factory in the limits of Xwieki Hal Gharghur. The gfeast of St Helen was to be celebrated on the 19th of August and thus the factory was packed with explosives.

At the time of the explosions there were 6 men working. Luckily one of them Joe Bonello was found and taken to St Lukes hospital with extensive burns.

The salvage operation was postponed for the next day as it was too dangerous.

The next morning on commencement the bodies of 34 year old Sonny Borg and 24 year old Richard Cardona were found. Both were from Birkirkara. Borg was found at 0845 and Cardona at 1615. The salvage operation was again postponed as there were still fires.

Early morning of the 29th of June the three other bodies were found. These were 22 year old Carmel farrugia, 47 year old Paul Bonnici and 68 year old Vincent Galea.

The funeral was to be held on Saturday 30th June but was postponed as the bodies had to be identified with DNA tests. Only Sonny Borg did not need any tests for identification.

Meanwhile Joseph Bonello was released from the section known as High Dependency Unit. The funeral was eventually held on the 10th of July 2007.

Traditional Maltese Buses feature at three MaltaPost stamps







In celebration of the traditional buses of Malta and Gozo, MaltaPost is to issue a set of three stamps entitled – Maltese Buses. The stamps set is designed by MaltaPost, with photographs by Richard Stedall and Marco Zammit. The origins of the Maltese bus service dates back to 1905. Buses were often owner-driven thereby fostering a friendly rivalry leading to the heavily customised buses endearing themselves to the public at large. In their simplicity, they were distinct, and through their unique characteristics, one could observe the impact the buses had on Malta's cultural identity.

These stamps will be issued in a sheet of 10 stamps, with each stamp measuring 44mm x 31mm, a comb perforation 14.0 x 13.9 and bearing the Maltese Cross watermark. The sheets measure 118mm x 185mm and were produced by Printex Ltd in the offset process.

The issue consists of 500,000 of the €0.30 stamp, 100,000 of the €0.50 stamp and 300,000 of the €0.86 stamp. This philatelic issue will be available from all Post Offices in Malta and Gozo as from Thursday, the 7th of October.

Church-Owned Land

Church ownership of land could not increase at the same rate it had tended to follow before Government restrictions were imposed. Between 1891 and 1901, Church ownership of cultivated land had gone up from 16.5% to 17.1%, whereas the increase for the whole period between 1901 and 1945 was just 1.4%.

Emphyteutic lease was again common in this sector; some leases have been of so long duration that some farmers do not really know whether their land is freehold.

It could sometimes be very difficult to determine

the exact ownership of a piece of land in what are traditionally held to be Church estates because records have not always been accurate. One major effect of the high incidence of this form of lease was that the farmer could not be persuaded to set up reasonably good dwellings on land he did not own. Technically, what improvements were made on the land would accrue to the owner on the expiry of the lease. Such farmers who knew of this stipulation, and one has reason to believe they were the majority, were not ready to erect lasting farm-dwellings on such sites, and the same difficulty applied to expensive irrigation schemes requiring individual financing. Given the nature of the lease and, particularly, the power it conveyed on the farmer's heirs to have a continuation of the lease on preferential terms, this caution was rather difficult to understand unless one bears in mind the parsimonious habits of the Maltese farmer.

Church-Owned land was passed on to the Government in 1995 and is controlled by a Joint Office



Malta needs to solve the illegal hunting problem



BirdLife Malta is urging the Government of Malta to reinitiate the verification process of stuffed protected bird collections that had benefitted from two amnesties in the past. During these amnesties offered in 1997 and 2003, hunters had declared over 520,000 stuffed protected birds.

Verification process of stuffed birds needs to resume

During the initial verification process under MEPA officials (where the actual collections were reconciled with the declared list and appropriately tagged), it became evident that most hunters had declared more birds than what they actually had. This was purposely done by those who still wanted to hunt protected birds after the amnesties so that they would still be in time to list them under the forgiven lists.

The verification process with collections being tagged stopped around six years ago, just a year or so after the <u>Wild Birds Regulation Unit</u> (WBRU) was created. This means that hunters who have an unverified collection and shoot down protected birds can still include these birds in their collections and get away scot-free.

In view of this, illegal hunting started to increase, becoming so rampant in the last four years that even the European Commission has been raising this issue with the Maltese Government. In fact, between 2014 and 2017 there were 190

protected birds that were verified by the government veterinarian as being illegally shot, compared to the shameful 523 illegally shot protected birds so far since 2018 (see bottom table). These figures are only the tip of the iceberg, since nearly all shot protected birds are retrieved by the hunters themselves, but they are indicative of the drastic upward trend.

The verification process is also very important as it regulates the hunting of protected birds, including those under the CITES Convention, by Maltese hunters on hunting trips abroad. These are normally smuggled in illegally in time to be placed in unverified collections.

Apart from the increase in illegal hunting of protected birds, the lacuna created when the verification process was halted has also fuelled the illegal trade of wildlife in Malta both from abroad and locally. Illegal hunters are making big money from selling shot protected birds to those who have their collections still unverified, and hence in time to include them. Such trading is not only illegal under the EU Birds Directive, but also under the EU Wildlife Trade regulations.

BirdLife Malta CEO Mark Sultana stated: "Malta has a responsibility to solve the illegal hunting of protected birds. While enforcement remains crucial, it is also crucial that the verification process by a team of experts which the Government already has available, is reinstated. The Prime Minister and his Cabinet need to understand that the only ones benefitting from this delay are those that break the law."

Sue Abela and Paul Gray confirmed as BOV National Bowling Senior Champions for 2021

The BOV National Seniors Championship, for players 50 years and up, was held recently at the Eden Superbowl, and saw Sue Abela and Paul Gray keep the titles they won last year.

Abela dominated the ladies' group, never being in any

danger of losing her grip on this title. In fact, she finished over 500 pins ahead of second-place Liliana Spiteri.

After a poor start, Marthese Cossai clawed some pins back on Spiteri but did not manage to recover the gap and had to settle for 3rd place, just under 100 pins behind Spiteri.

The men's section was as expected, hotly contested. Day 1 saw Kenneth Arpa take the lead with a 193-average including the age-related bonus pins, ahead of Joe Cassar, Gray and Mark Spiteri. Day 2 saw Gray climb up to first, ahead of Spiteri, Cassar and Dennis Mercieca, with Arpa having a poor second set of 6 games and falling to 5th place.

Gray was unfazed and hammered in a last 3 game set of 685 (228 scratch average) against a 564 by Spiteri and a 665 by Arpa. Gray defended his title by 83 pins, including his higher age-related bonus over Spiteri. Arpa just missed out on second place, 8 pins behind Spiteri, while still playing the highest overall scratch average of 198 pins.

An instrument that plays without touch

On Saturday 23rd November at 7.15 pm, the Gran Salon at the National Museum of Archaeology in Valletta will host a remarkable performance by one of the world's best theremin players, Carolina Eyck.

This event is organised by Electronic Music Malta in collaboration with Heritage Malta and Black Box Pro and is sponsored by the German-Maltese Circle and the Goethe Institute.

The theremin is a most unusual musical instrument since it is controlled or played without physically coming into contact with any part of it. It works electronically and can produce sound when the performer moves his or her hands through the invisible electromagnetic fields that the instrument produces. The sounds which emanate from the theremin are quite unique,

often compared to squealing or wailing, creating an eerie atmosphere.

The instrument is named after its Russian inventor, Lev Sergeyevich Termen, or Léon Theremin as he is known in the United States. When he came out with this instrument in the 1920s, it was quite a sensation. The theremin was used in the soundtracks of some popular movies including Alfred Hitchcock's 'Spellbound' (1945).

In this event, German-Sorbian musician and composer, Carolina Eyck, will bring music from her newest album 'Elegies for Theremin & Voice'. This concert celebrates the album's release and the centennial of the invention of the theremin. The album features Eyck's inventive original compositions and improvisations — a meditation on mortality and loss. The concert will utilize a surround sound system, allowing theremin to break free and fill the space, in sync the movement of her dance-like performances.

Young Maltese singer-songwriter Yasmin Kuymizakis, better known as YEWS, will start off this event with a short performance. Tickets are available from Heritage Malta museums and sites and online. For more information, visit the Heritage Malta website.
