I firmly believe that despite the geographical distance that separates you from Malta and Gozo, you still feel very close to the traditions that make us unique as a People, and this undoubtedly applies to the celebration of Christmas.

Many of you in lands far from ours, might have set up a Nativity scene or a baby Jesus in the warmth of your home, as our ancestors used to do over the years, and are preparing for the traditional Christmas meal with your loved ones.

I also believe that at this time of the year, Maltese associations, clubs, and band clubs abroad meet - despite long distances - for typical Christmas parties that bring together large numbers of their members. This love of tradition and sense of belonging is extraordinary. I reiterate my appreciation for the role and function served by this Council. I would also like to commend the initiative for the First Virtual Forum, taken by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, addressed to the youths of the Maltese diaspora.

Message of good wishes for Christmas and New Year by Hon. Ian Borġ, Minister for Foreign and European Affairs and Trade for Maltese living abroad

Dear all,

This is my first message to you as Minister

responsible for Foreign and European Affairs and Trade.

We have got to the end of another year, a year full of difficult challenges, both for us, the Maltese, as well as for all of humanity around the globe. The challenges were various, especially those which resulted from what is going on around us. However, our country, just like others, had to face other challenges such as the recovery from the pandemic and challenges to reinforce our country's institutions so that they reflect the times we are living in. We have done this, and will go on doing it, because it is a process by means of which our country can move forward.

The year ahead is an important one for Malta, due to the fact that we will take part in the United Nations Security Council. Malta will show the maturity it acquired along the time, from Independence to Freedom Day until we joined the EU. Now is the time to show how our country can contribute further for the common benefit of mankind, such as with regard to the struggle against climate change, as well as the enhancement of stability and dialogue between the peoples.

I cannot but comment on what is going on at our doorstep in Ukraine. We have never understood and cherished peace as much as today. We had never envisaged that we would have another war in the European continent, that would lead to such serious consequences both in Europe and internationally.

We must harbor peace, by respecting and supporting each other, both among us, the Maltese, as well as among nations. It is therefore, important, that you and us, Maltese and Gozitans living all over the world will keep on working for peace. It is inconceivable that at this day and age, with so much cultural, social or technological development, some choose war over peace.

Our country, thus, will go on assisting the Ukrainian people in a humanitarian way with the

resources at our disposal. Nobody should be afraid to live in his own home, and likewise, the Ukrainian people should be able to live in peace in their own homeland.

We have an important role in all that happens around us. We are all for peace, and we must carry on with this pursuit for peace, so that in spite of our resources, we contribute further on an international level in favour of social justice, progress, equality and peace.

It is particularly for this reason that Malta's role in the UN Security Council as from next year will be a determining one. Our commitment in this sense remains clear and based on the principles of peace and dialogue.

Dear all, I cannot but also mention that as from this legislature, trade forms part of this Ministry. And that's why, I would like to bring to the fore the incessant toil to push our trade forward, to wander further away and make of it another link of which our country should feel honoured and out of which we are bound to get more positive results for our country and our businesses, that are close to our heart.

We have worked incessantly in the interest of the Maltese living abroad, so much so, that, this year focused on a number of high-quality projects amongst which the launching of the Persons of Value Form. This is aimed at compiling a registry for the Ministry, of Maltese living abroad, that, with their talents and experience can contribute productively towards our country. It is also worth mentioning, the setting up of Regional Councils which aim to reach out to more Maltese abroad at grass-root level, as well as the new equipment launched for the Consul-on-the-Move that should help so that such service is rendered in a more efficient way.

In September, we held the first Virtual Youth Forum for young Maltese living abroad, where subjects related to the Maltese language, culture and identity, chosen by the participants themselves were discussed. In October, I also had the honour to host the 14th Annual Meeting of the Council for Maltese Living Abroad – the first

physical meeting after a two-year absence due to the pandemic.

This was my first opportunity as Minister for Foreign Affairs, to meet this Council that has the role of safeguarding and promoting the rights and interests of Maltese living abroad.

This year was also a hectic year when it comes to diplomatic work, where, while we continued to strengthen our diplomatic and consular presence in other strategically important countries in South America, Africa and the Middle East, we also worked on a strategy that brings us closer to countries

with big potential with regard to political, commercial and cultural cooperation, while still being faithful to our goals agreed upon at European and international level to address climate change in an effective way.

Malta believes in the principles of peace, social justice and equality. So, we need to keep on working so that such principles which we believe in, remain the framework of our work so as to have a better world for us as well as for the generations that follow. This is the time when Malta has to push on to contribute for the benefit of the whole of humanity.

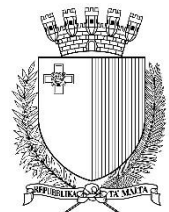

GHAJNSIELEM A BEAUTIFUL VILLAGE IN THE ISLAND OF GOZO MALTA

The Ghajnsielem Christmas Tree has been classified as one of the “best and most beautiful in Europe” according to the popular website – [European Best Destinations](#). The website is describing Ghajnsielem as the place to visit for “a sunny and



Christmas is very important to the people of Malta and its sister Island of Gozo. Most people on Malta are Catholics and go to a Midnight Mass Service. Usually the churches are full with people. In Maltese Happy/Merry Christmas is 'Il-Milied it-Tajjeb'.

The Churches are decorated with lights and nativity cribs, 'Presepu', built by the church goers. The cribs are decorated with figurines, called 'pasturi' (representing figures like the shepherds and angels). Today some of the cribs are mechanical and the figures in them move! The figure of the baby Jesus is put on the main altar at midnight on Christmas night. At Epiphany it is traditional to put the three figures of the Magi (Wise Men) in the crib. There is a group on Malta called 'Friends of the Crib' who help to keep the Maltese crib tradition alive.

Cribs were first introduced into Malta from Italy by rich noblemen. They were not popular at first and most were burnt. The first true Maltese crib is believed to have been made in Malta in 1617 and was displayed in the Dominican Friars Church in Rabat. In St Peter's Monastery in Mdina, there is a crib dating back to 1670. This is treasured and looked after by the Benedictine Nuns who live in the monastery. At about the same time, another

Maltese man made a crib with moving parts powered by water! As cribs became more popular they also became more 'Maltese' with people replacing the Italian looking buildings and trades people with local ones. (Flour windmills were and are still popular buildings to feature in a crib scene.) The first imported Italian 'pasturi' were very expensive and most people couldn't afford them. So people started making their own 'pasturi' from rough clay and plaster. Some of these figures still exist today. (Modern pasturi are now often made of plastic.)

By the early to mid 20th century, cribs were thought of as old fashioned and not very popular anymore. To stop the decline of Christmas, in 1907, a priest called George Preca founded a children's charity and society called 'MUSEUM'. In 1921 he started a tradition of having a Christmas Eve procession with a life size figure of the Baby Jesus being carried at the head of the procession.

At sunset on Christmas Eve in 1921, Fra Diegu Street in the town of Hamrun was crowded with children and adults ready to take part in the first procession. In those days, street lighting was very poor in Malta and so many people brought lanterns with them to help them see their way during the procession and to

shed light on the statue of Baby Jesus carried shoulder-high by four boys. The different types of lamps included, gas powered bicycle headlamps, oil lamps used on farmers carts, colored paper lanterns, Venetian lights, palm fronds and olive branches. The idea became very popular with people of all ages and so the very special Maltese traditional started. These processions are still popular today and form part of the Christmas Eve celebrations. In 1986 the 'Friends of the Crib' society was formed and now they have over 500 members. Every year, in the weeks running up to Christmas, the Friends put on a exhibition of about 100 cribs of all shapes and sizes.

Maltese houses are often also decorated with cribs with 'pasturi' (which are small plastic or clay figures representing figures like the shepherds and angels). Large figures of the baby Jesus are sometimes put behind windows or in balconies and lit at night. Houses are also decorated with Christmas wreaths, candles and all sorts of other decorations. Every household also has a Christmas Tree decorated with light bulbs, tinsel and Christmas decorations.

It is traditional to sow wheat, grain and canary seed, 'gulbiena', on cotton buds in flat pans five weeks before Christmas. These are left in dark corners in the

house until the seeds produce white grass-like shoots. The pans with the fully-grown shoots are then used to decorate the crib or the statue of Baby Jesus.

One Maltese Christmas tradition is the 'Priedka tat-Tifel' which means 'the preaching of the child'. A boy or a girl, normally aged 7 to 10, does the preaching of the sermon at the midnight mass instead of the priest! The children learn the sermon by heart and start learning it four or five weeks before they preach on Christmas Eve. The parents are also very excited and nervous about the performance, as they would have helped the children to learn the sermon. The boy or girl tells the story of the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem and is encouraged to give their sermon a personal delivery which will touch the hearts of the church-goers.

George Sapiano delivered the first known Christmas Eve sermon by an altar boy in 1883, in the parish church of Luqa. It has also become common for local churches to organise a mini-pageant with children dressed up as shepherds, Joseph and Mary carrying a baby doll (representing Jesus) acting out the story of the Nativity. This re-enactment starts at 11pm and is followed by High Mass at midnight.

A popular Maltese carol is 'ninni la tibkix izjed'. It means 'sleep and cry no more' and was written by the Jesuit Priest, Fr. Andrew Schembri (1774-1862) from Luqa for Maltese migrants in Tunis.

There is a village on Malta called 'Siggiewi' dedicated to St.

Nicholas, who is also known as San Niklaw, of Bari in Italy and its feast is celebrated on the last Sunday of June.

Children on Malta get their presents from Santa Claus on Christmas night. Sometimes, Father Christmas comes knocking at doors early on Christmas night delivering presents!

Schools in Malta often hold a Christmas concert. Most of the children take part. It consists of Christmas Carols, plays with a Christmas theme, mimes and poetry recitals, etc. It is enjoyed by the children and teachers alike. Christmas parties are also often held in each class. Sometimes the children bring food which their parents prepare at home and it is shared with every one in their class. Gifts are exchanged and sometimes money is collected which is given to charity.

A concert and Christmas party is held every year at the Residential Home for the Disabled in Siggiewi. The residents take part in Christmas plays and carol singing helped by the people who work who work in the Home including Nuns. The Home is decorated and the atmosphere is great. The chapel is decorated with a beautiful crib with Baby Jesus. On Christmas Eve, a procession with the Baby Jesus is held and then Midnight Mass. Relatives of the residents also participate in the Christmas celebrations. Special food is prepared and the atmosphere is very happy!

Voluntary organisations also organise Carol Singing evenings

in old people's homes and hospitals, helping to cheer up the elderly and sick with the spirit of Christmas.

Under the patronage of the President of Malta, the Community Chest Fund sets up a tent in Freedom Square in the town of Valletta, where volunteers help to raise donations of cash. The donations are then distributed to charity organisations such as orphanages and other charities, which often rely on donations to continue their work in the community.

Maltese people have a wide range of food at Christmas. Traditionally, the Maltese housewife kept the fattest capon/rooster, 'hasi', especially for Christmas Lunch, which was roasted at the local bakery in a casserole full of potatoes and vegetables. The traditional dessert served at Christmas was the Treacle Ring, 'Qaghqa tal-Ghasel', and to finish it off, a hot Chestnut and Cocoa Soup, 'Imbuljuta tal-Qastan', which was and is served as a cosy night cap during the cold December days in Malta.

Today the traditional Maltese menu has made way for Christmas Turkey, Christmas Cakes, Christmas Puddings and Mince Pies, all inherited during 164 years of British rule (1800 - 1964) in Malta. Italian Panettone has also become a Christmas favourite.

Ursuline Sisters to sing traditional Christmas song to raise funds for children’s centre project



This year, a group of five Ursuline Sisters will sing the Maltese popular Christmas song “Ninni La Tibkix Iżjed” to raise funds for a new project in Tas-Sliema aimed at further assisting children and families.

Here I am in my university graduation picture. I never thought that I would go to university and get a degree as I felt that it was out of my reach. However, I entered as a mature aged student and four years ago at the age of 50 I graduated with a Bachelor of Social Work (honours) degree. I must say I am proud of this achievement, acknowledging that I couldn't have done it without my husband and my parents, as they supported me all of the way.

I grew up as an only child to Joseph and Georgina Chetcuti. They were both children when their families migrated to Australia from Malta. Our families are now extended due to many of us being married, with children and grandchildren. I am fortunate to have love and support from my parents in all that I do. I was very active with sport as a younger person, playing tennis (we had a tennis club across the road from where we lived), netball for the school and basketball (both school and church club). Throughout my schooling at St. Mary's College my mum would come and watch me play sports and although my dad was working, he was in retail, they both were always encouraging and supportive. I completed all my schooling from grade one to year twelve at St. Mary's College. Back then we were also taught by nuns. Once I completed high school, I had applied for College as I wanted to be an Art or kindy

teacher. Nevertheless, despite my good grades I was not successful with obtaining entry into further education. I then went on to find my first job as a receptionist in a physiotherapist clinic (which I thoroughly enjoyed) and from there on I had many jobs from office work, courier, running my own Motel business, catering in a hospital and then as a receptionist for a non for-profit organisation that changed my career course immensely. During this period, I was offered opportunities of further study to which I accepted and upon completing these courses I applied and was successful in obtaining a coordinator role managing home care packages out in the community in aged care. Throughout the following years I remained and continued further studies within the aged care industry, as this provided me additional opportunity to experience various roles, enabling my skills and knowledge to grow.

Along the way I was fortunate to make good networking contacts that also provided me with support and information that enhanced my work practice and enjoyment of the aged care industry. I wanted to remain in this industry and noted a shift of qualifications required to obtain jobs that I have already worked in, including the current role I was working in and decided it was time I obtain such qualification.

I did some research and decided to become a social worker.

I enrolled and was accepted to UniSA at the Magill Campus.

I worked and studied full time.

As I was doing my honours the final year was to write a paper, the topic being of your own choice. I therefore wrote a paper which was titled "The meaning of home for baby boomers and grey nomads". Writing a paper was always going to be challenging as English was not one of my best subjects at school. I completed the paper and my lecturer who was also my mentor with assisting me with support to complete the paper stated she really liked what I wrote. L-istil ta' presepu Sqalli, ġie introdott f'Malta minn patri Frangiskan minn Sqallija, Benedetto Papale, li hu magħruf li bena numru mhux ħażin ta' presepi matul iż-żjara tiegħu f'Malta.

L-istil Sqalli kien aktar aċċettabbli għall-Maltin, forsi minhabba x-xebh bejn il-kampanja Maltija u dik Sqallija murija fil-presepi. Minkejja dan, il-poplu Malti ried li jkollu l-presepu tiegħu li fih tradizzjonijiet lokali, snajja', kostumi, strumenti mużikali u bini. Il-farmhouse u l-mithna tar-riħ tad-dqiq Maltin għadhom jidhru bi prominenza fil-presepi mibnija lokalment. Il-bini tal-presepi f'Malta kellu l-aqwa żmien tiegħu matul id-dsatax u l-ewwel parti tas-seklu għoxrin. Wara l-Milied il-presepu ġie żarmat u l-'ġebel' inhażen għas-sena ta' wara. L-introduzzjoni ta' fjuwils moderni fil-fran neħhiet il-faħam u għalhekk il-provvista tal-'gagazza' saret remota ħafna, filwaqt li l-użu tal-ġebel kien pjuttost ingombranti.

Għalhekk id-dilettanti tal-presepi daru għal medium ieħor, il-kartapesta. Dan għamel presepi aktar solidi u ħfief; madankollu pprezentat problema ta' ħażna. Għal din ir-raġuni, il-presepi ħafna drabi kienu meqruda wara l-Milied. Aspett ieħor interessanti tal-Presepu huwa l-evoluzzjoni tal-istatwetti jew 'pasturi'. L-ewwel figurini artistici kienu pjuttost għoljin u għalhekk lil hinn mil-lat tal-bniedem ordinarju. Għalhekk fassal il-metodu tiegħu kif jagħmel il-'pasturi'. Billi uża t-tafal tal-art, hu sawwar dak li dehru qishom figuri imħattek ħafna. Iż-żebgħa għenet biex tiddefinixxi l-wiċċ, l-idejn u l-ħwejjegħ. Ix-xama' tan-naħal kienet tintuża wkoll fil-forom biex isiru repliki ta' Ġesù Bambin u statwetti oħra.

Lejn nofs is-Seklu 20, ittradizzjonijiet u l-folklor ġew imwarrba minn dekorazzjonijiet tal-Milied aktar moderni. Kemm f'Malta kif ukoll barra, il-Presepu sar biss tiżjin ieħor tal-Milied u minhabba xxogħol meħtieġ fil-bini tiegħu, għamel spazju għas-sigra tal-Milied u dekorazzjonijiet oħra faċli biex jintramaw. Il-produzzjoni tal-massa ta' figurini tal-plastik, miżbugħin fi stili u kuluri brillanti, ma kellhiex il-prestigju tal-figura magħmula bl-idejn individwalment u għenet biex it-tradizzjoni tiddeterjora saħansitra aktar.

Fis-sena 1907, twaqqfet is-Socjetà għad-Duttrina Reliġjuża, magħrufa bħala M.U.S.E.U.M.. Imhegħa mill-motto tagħha, 'VERBUM DEI CARO FACTUM EST', li litteralment tfisser: 'Il-Kelma ta' Alla saret Bniedem', din is-Socjetà, taħt it-tmexxija tal-fundatur tagħha, San Ġorġ Preca, għamlitha l-kompitu tagħha li terġa' tkebbes. L-imhabba għall-Milied reali. Kull Diċembru, it-tfal kienu jingħataw replika ta' Ġesù Bambin jew presepu żgħir bħala rigal. Inizjattiva oħra ta' din is-Socjetà kienet it-twertiq ta' purċissjoni lejlet il-Milied li matulha ngarret replika ta' Ġesù Bambin b'qies naturali u tkantaw innijiet reliġjużi tal-Milied. L-ewwel minn dawn il-purċissjonijiet saret fl-1921

Fl-1986, grupp ta' dawn id-dilettanti tal-Presepu ltaqghu flimkien u ffurmaw il-**'HBIEB TAL-PRESEPU'**. L-iskop tal-grupp huwa li jippromwovi t-tradizzjoni tal-presepu f'Malta. Minn dakinhar, is-Socjetà rnexxielha terga' tqanqal l-imħabba lejn il-Presepu u tista' tiftaħar b'aktar minn erba' mitt membru attiv.

Madwar mitt presepu ta' diversi forom u daqsijiet magħmulin minn mezzi differenti bħall-kartapesta, polystyrene, sufra, eċċ., jingabru flimkien biex joffru lill-viżitaturi, nies tal-lokal u turisti, l-istorja vera tal-Milied, IT-TWELID TA' ĠESÙ BAMBIN.

After recently two promising young Maltese cyclists who form part of the Maltese National team went for two days of testing their cycling abilities with the Eolo-Kometa Professional Team in one of their quarters in Varese, now Luke Borg (The Cyclist) and Jacob Schembri (Mosta) in a training camp that will be held in Oliva near Valencia in Spain from 13 to 18 December 2022 with the Under 23 team of Eolo-Kometa. Apart from the fact that they will also train with professional cyclists, where this will be a strong test for them to see if in the future they join the same under-23 team as the Eolo-Kometa team.

After this, there will be the possibility that next year they will compete internationally with the same Under 23 team, and then they will be evaluated by the team itself so that over the years they will see if they can pass for professionals. DOLORES CRISTINA Granted Malta's Highest Honour in the Republic 2022 Ceremony

Ten people were honoured with Malta's highest honour in the traditional Republic Day ceremony held in Valletta on Tuesday.

On Republic Day each year, the President, on behalf of the Government and

people of Malta, pays public tribute to a number of Maltese citizens who distinguish themselves in different fields of endeavour, by appointing them to The National Order of Merit or to the Xirka Ġieħ ir-Repubblika, or by awarding them the Midalja għall-Qlubija or the Midalja għall-Qadi tar-Repubblika.

This year's investiture ceremony took place at The Palace, Valletta, on Tuesday 13 December 2022, immediately following the customary ceremonial parade held at the Palace Square. One of the recipients is Mrs Dolores Cristina. Dolores was born in Senglea in 1949. She is a former Maltese politician who served in several ministerial positions under Nationalist Governments. Cristina graduated from the RUM (Royal University of Malta) with a Bachelor of Arts

(Hons) degree and held teaching posts in History and English at Secondary and Post-Secondary levels. Between 1991 and 1995, she held the post of President of the National Council of Women, with a strong involvement in the voluntary sector. She was also President of the Women's Section and President of the Administrative Council of the Nationalist Party. In 1996 she contested the General Election unsuccessfully and in 1998 she served briefly as Mayor of Swieqi until she was elected to Parliament in the same year from the 10th district. During the legislature, she occupied the post of Chair of the Foreign Affairs Committee.

She was re-elected to Parliament from the 9th District in the 2003 general election and became Parliamentary Secretary within the Ministry of Social Policy. In the 2004 Cabinet reshuffle, she was appointed Minister for the Family and Social Solidarity, with a portfolio including social policy, family policy, child policy, solidarity services, social security, social housing and equality. In 2008, elected from both the 9th and 10th districts, Cristina was appointed Minister for Education and Culture, also assuming responsibility for the Ministry of Social Policy during the years 2010-2012. In 2013, Dolores Cristina was appointed Acting President, a post she occupied until 2022

Fried Ġbejna with Side Salad

Serves 2

Ingredients:

- 2 Ġbejniet (cheese slices)
- 1 cup plain flour
- 2 eggs
- 1.5 cups breadcrumbs
- Salt & pepper
- Mixed herbs

Method:

- Slice your ġbejniet in half, which will give

you 4 portions

- Mix the breadcrumbs with the herbs, salt and pepper and place in a bowl
- Place the beaten eggs in a bowl
- Dip the ġbejna first into the flour, then the egg mixture, then the breadcrumbs
- Remove any excess crumbs and shallow fry in a well-oiled pan
- Let them fry for approx. 7 minutes on each side. When you begin to see the edges brown, flip them
- Once done lay them on a paper napkin to absorb excess oil and rest before serving
- Serve with a small side salad and a dressing of your choice (chutney, mayo, cranberry sauce)

Irkotta Cannoli

Serves 8

Ingredients:

- 8 cannoli cases
- 250g fresh Benna irkotta
- 65g icing sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 200g chopped pistachios

Method:

- For the filling, first let the irkotta sit in a strainer over a small bowl in the refrigerator for 30 minutes to remove excess water
- Mix the irkotta with icing sugar, vanilla and some of the chopped pistachios
- Chill in the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes
- Fill a piping bag with the mixture, and pipe into the cannoli cases
- Decorate the cannoli ends with the remaining chopped pistachios
- Chill until ready to serve. When you finish don't forget to send me one CANNOL.



Imbuljuta tal-Qastan – Hot Chestnut drink

Imbuljuta tal-Qastan is a traditional hot and spiced cocoa-based Maltese drink served after midnight Mass at Christmas and at New Year's Eve.

Servings: [6](#) people

Ingredients

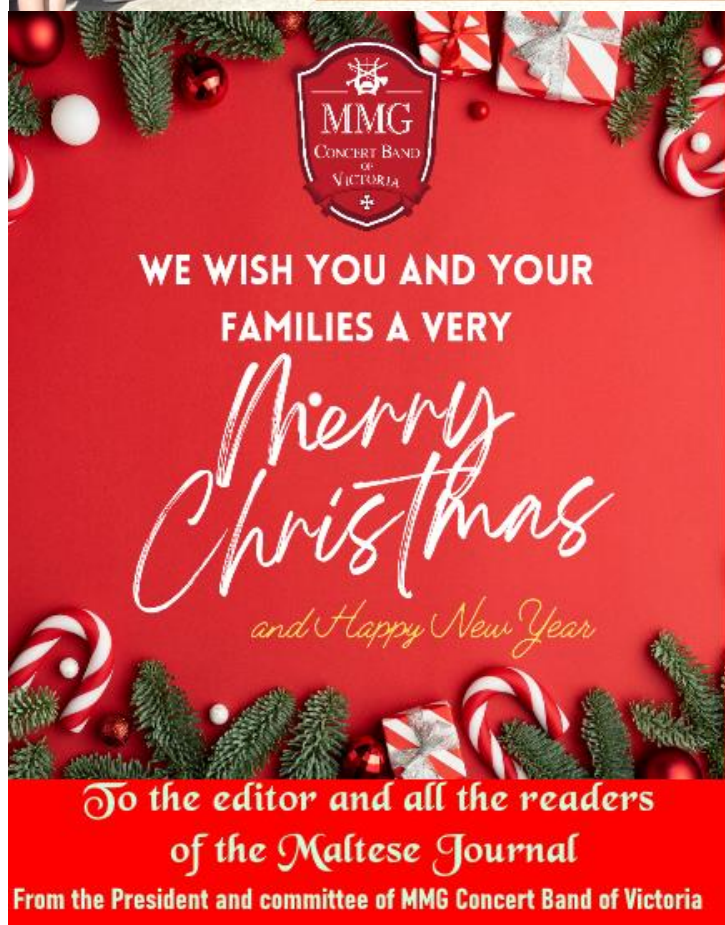
- 2 cups dried peeled chestnuts
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup cocoa powder
- 1 stick cinnamon
- 6 cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon spice blend (cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, etc.)
- Rind of a mandarin
- 4 tablespoons corn-starch
- 3 tablespoons sour cream (optional)

Instructions

1. Wash and soak the chestnuts for at least 8 hours.
2. Drain and put the chestnuts in a pan. Add 4 cups (1l) of water, cinnamon, cloves, cocoa powder, sugar, spice blend and mandarin rind cut in small pieces.
3. Bring to a boil and simmer until the chestnuts are tender, about 1 hour.
4. At the end of cooking, break the chestnuts into small pieces with a large spoon without crushing them.
5. Dissolve the corn-starch in a little water and add to slightly thicken the sauce.
6. Serve hot in a cup or a bowl.
