In 1993 the Council held a National Conference of the Federation of Maltese Community Councils of Australia. Delegates from interstate attended the Conference.

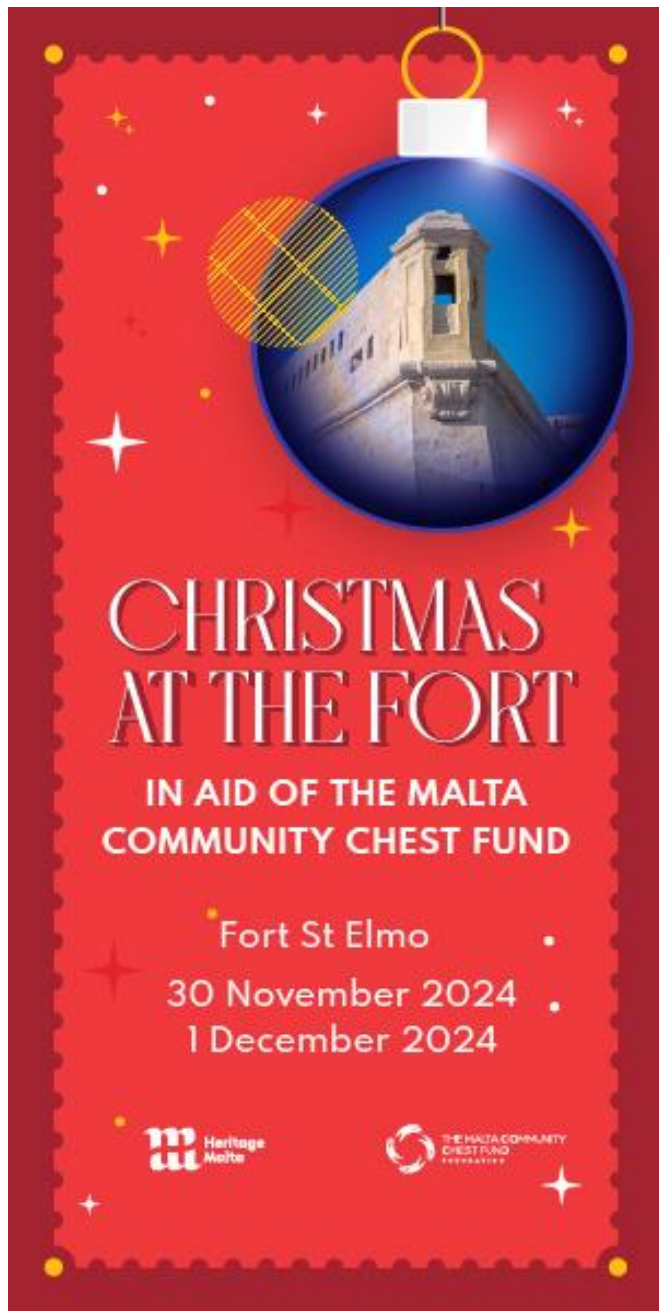

**ANZAC MEMORIAL AT PROSPECT, SOUTH AUSTRALIA**

The plaque, mounted on a plinth adjacent to the war memorial, commemorates the South Australian soldiers who fought during the Gallipoli campaign during World War One, and are buried in Malta. The plaque was unveiled to commemorate the ANZAC Centenary 1915 -2015.

CLIMATE CHANGE

We already see effects scientists predicted, such as the loss of sea ice, melting glaciers and ice sheets, sea level rise, and more intense heat waves. Scientists predict global temperature increases from human-made greenhouse gases will continue. Severe weather damage will also increase and intensify.



Climate change has many consequences around the world, including:

- **Rising sea levels:** A direct consequence of climate change that can cause flooding
- **Droughts:** Can severely impact food production, water availability, and human health
- **More extreme weather events:** Includes heat waves, intense hurricanes, and more intense storms
- **Air quality:** Climate change can cause air quality to change, and extreme weather events like heat waves and droughts can adversely affect air quality
- **Sea ice extent:** Global warming has caused a significant reduction in the extent of sea ice in the polar regions
- **Human health:** Climate change can directly and indirectly impact human health by affecting the food we eat, the water we drink, the air we breathe, and the weather we experience
- **Emission instability:** Global emissions are the biggest contributing factor to climate change

Dinja Wahda's 30 years of inspiring children to protect nature in Malta and Gozo

The 30th anniversary of Dinja Wahda, the flagship environmental education programme, has been celebrated by BirdLife Malta with a special awards ceremony.

The event honoured over 50 primary schools from Malta and Gozo for their outstanding contributions to conservation and environmental education.

Since its launch in 1994, *Dinja Wahda* has grown from a small initiative into a nationwide movement, instilling environmental values across generations.

BirdLife Malta explained that run in collaboration with the Education Directorate, the programme has become an annual tradition in most primary schools in the Maltese Islands, a testament to the dedication of teachers, partners, and supporters. The ceremony celebrated the collective efforts of all who have been part of this 30-year journey.

In an audiovisual message for this occasion, the President of the European Parliament, Roberta Metsola, stated that the small size of the Maltese islands represents a challenge as they lack large environmental and natural spaces like those found in other countries. She said it is everyone's responsibility to protect and enhance what we have for present and future generations.

"We're thrilled to see so many students here with us – our true ambassadors for nature," remarked BirdLife Malta President Darryl Grima. "Your commitment reminds us of the powerful impact we can have on conservation."

BirdLife Malta thanked key partners who made this event possible, including Bank Of Valletta for their continued sponsorship of the *Dinja Wahda* programme; Merlin Publishers and Outlook Coop for donating books as gifts; Erasmus+ and EUPA for supporting the "A Superpower to Defend Nature" and Blooming Schools projects and the European Solidarity Corps Volunteers who shared the interesting work they do for BirdLife Malta in the different departments.

The ceremony concluded with a celebratory candle-blowing for *Dinja Wahda's* 30th anniversary. "Here's to many more years of *Dinja Wahda*, fostering the next generation of environmental stewards across Malta and Gozo," BirdLife Malta said.

Seventeen countries sent their best young talent to compete for the Junior Eurovision trophy, and after a top-quality show, one act came out victorious.

The winner of Junior Eurovision 2024 is Andria Putkaradze and Georgia with the song 'To My Mum'.

MALTA REPRESENTATIVE AT THE CONTEST- RAMIRES SCIBERRAS

Ramires Sciberras in third place from the public vote.

Malta ranked fifth during the 22nd edition of the Junior Eurovision Song Contest held in Madrid, Spain. This year 12-year-old Ramires Sciberras participated with the song Stilla Ckejkna by Aleandro Spiteri Monseigneur, Lon Kirkop and Peter Borg. Ramires also came in third place from the public's votes, with 79 points. However, he came in fifth place with the total votes, with a total of 153 points.

Ramires won the right to represent Malta in the Junior Eurovision after winning the contest organized by the Maltese national channel, PBS last September. This edition of the Junior Eurovision Song Contest was won by Georgia, which was represented by Andria Putkaradze with the song To My Mom.

He had a total of 239 points. During this edition of the Junior Eurovision Song Contest, 17 countries took part. This was the first time that the Junior Eurovision Song Contest was held in Madrid in Spain, as well as the first time since 2015 that the Junior Eurovision Song Contest was staged on a Saturday. For this edition Cyprus and San Marino returned to this contest while the United Kingdom chose not to participate this year.

Ramires Sciberras' musical journey has taken him all across the world. He was born in Cambodia, then moved to Malta to live with his adoptive parents when he was only a baby — his Junior Eurovision song is all about this experience. He considers his mum and dad to be his superheroes. At 12 years old, he's already had plenty of musical experience. He's been taking vocal lessons since he was 8 and entered singing competitions at home and internationally.

New Permanent Exhibit at Gozo's Il-Ħaġar Museum



Many Gozitans in their late twenties and older may remember visiting Frank Mizzi's massive nativity crib during Christmas time, which used to be on public display in an exhibition space annexed to his house in Fountain Street, just off St Augustine's Square. Those who do will probably recall that Christmas was not complete without a visit to this crib. It is a large crib, one that visitors can walk around, and a proper visit, accompanied by the commentary, would easily take around 20 minutes.

Frank Mizzi started building this unique Christmas crib around 40 years ago, and it has remained a work in progress ever since, with new features added over the years. In 2019, Mizzi, now in his eighties, together with his wife Tarcisia, decided to donate this unique work of art to Il-Ħaġar Museum. The crib was transferred from Mizzi's house to the museum, where it was reconstructed by a team of volunteers under Mizzi's supervision, and where it will remain on permanent display in the museum's newly developed lower ground floor.

Work on the surrounding area, part of which will be interactive, is still in progress but will be finalised in the coming months. This project will be inaugurated by Mizzi himself and blessed by Museum Founder and Curator Mgr Dr Joseph Farrugia this Friday, 22 November, at 7.30pm. Everyone is invited to attend. The Nativity crib can be visited during the museum opening hours of 09:00 to 17:00, seven days a week. Admission to Il-Ħaġar is free. This project has been co-financed by the Gozo Action Group Foundation through the LEADER programme.

IL-BORŻA TA' SAN MARTIN

A colourful cloth bag that is full of sweets, fruits, and nuts

In Maltese tradition, On St. Martin's Day, children are given a simple and colourful cloth bag that is full of sweets, fruits, and nuts. As per the custom, the bag includes an apple, an orange, a tangerine, a pomegranate along with a collection of walnuts, hazelnuts, chestnuts, shelled almonds and figs.

Sweets can also be included and usually one finds a glazed bun with a liquorice-sweet on top. Tradition has it that in days gone by, children used to hang this cloth bag onto their bed at bedtime and they would find all the goodies inside it in the morning. This tradition of a bounty on the feast of Saint Martin can be associated with the charity displayed by Saint Martin, but some say it originated from the times when the Church would be preparing for the fasting that was done during Advent and hence a good spread was a big treat before the 40 days of Advent..

THE CHAPEL OF SAINT MARTIN – IL-BAHRIJA



The original chapel was founded in the 15th century. It was mentioned in 1575 in inquisitor Pietro Dusina's report of his apostolic visit to Malta. Dusina mentions that the church lacked all means to use for the celebration of mass and that mass was only celebrated once a year. Dusina ordered the restoration of the chapel's door and ordered the parish priest of St Paul's Collegiate church in Rabat to encourage locals to care for the chapel. Years later, when Bishop Baldassare Cagliares visited the chapel in 1615 he found that Dusina's instructions were ignored and consequently deconsecrated the chapel.^[1]

In 1643, agreements were drawn to celebrate vespers on the eve of the feast of St Martin and mass on the feast day. In 1684, Bishop Miguel Jerónimo de Molina visited the chapel and mentions that mass was celebrated on Sundays and feast days. Around the same year the chapel was rebuilt through initiatives

of Cumbo Navarra.^[2]

The chapel was used frequently by the locals until a new larger church was built nearby. The chapel was recently extensively restored and is mostly used for perpetual adoration.

The chapel includes one altar and a painting depicting Martin of Tours, St James the Greater and St Philip Neri. It dates from 1735 and is the work of Francesco Zahra.

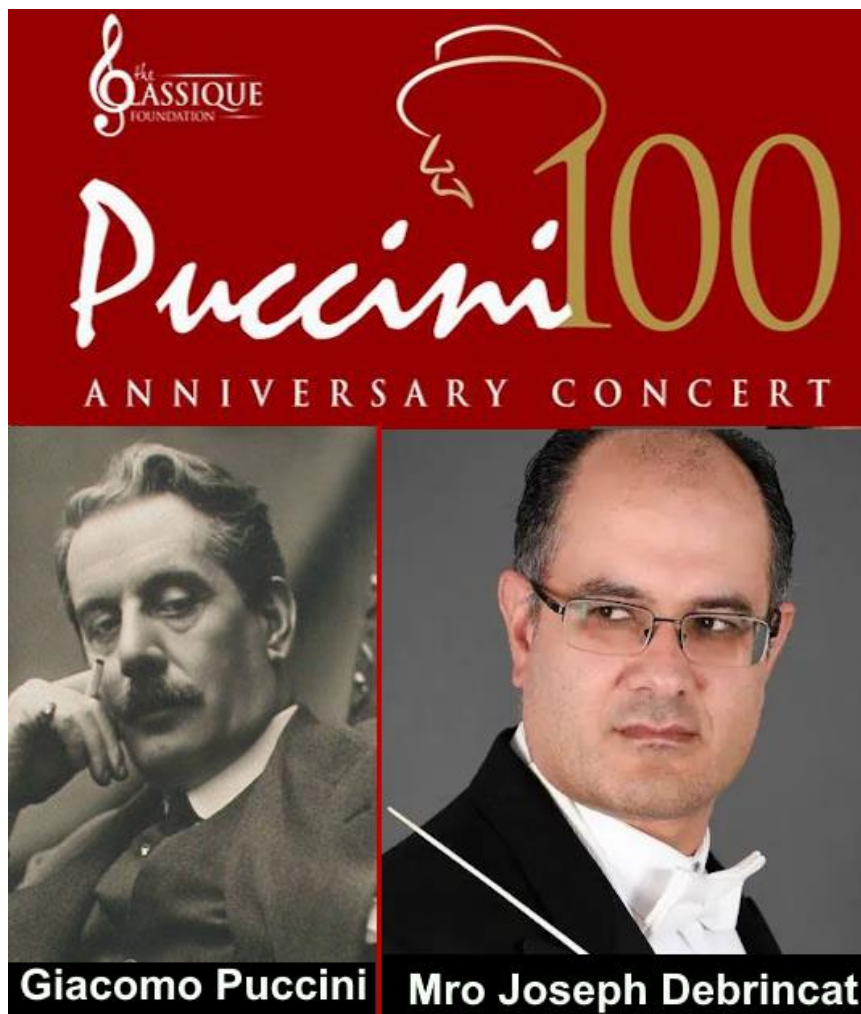

Miriam Friggieri (NSW AUSTRALIA)



Miriam Friggieri was born in the city of Liverpool, in the South-West of Sydney in the state of NSW, Australia. Miriam's parents, both born in Malta, immigrated to Sydney in 1959 with Miriam's two older brothers.

From a very young age, Miriam felt a very strong bond to her parents' homeland, taking a keen interest in its rich history and culture through her parents' stories of their experiences in Malta, especially as children during World War II. Miriam visited Malta for the first time at the age of 15. Meeting relatives and exploring Malta with her parents and younger brother, during a two month vacation, affirmed Miriam's affection for Malta.

In Australia, back in the 60's, immigrants were discouraged from speaking to their children in their native language but, somehow, like many Maltese families, Miriam and her brothers grew up understanding Maltese but not speaking it very well. Today, Miriam's Maltese has greatly improved, assisted by subsequent visits to Malta and, especially, via active participation in the Maltese community for nearly ten years.

Miriam is a proud dual citizen of Australia and Malta and is currently, since February 2021, the President of the Maltese Community Council of NSW (MCC) and, concurrently, the Vice-President of the Federation of Maltese Language Schools in Australia, and Treasurer for the Friends of Providence House NSW (raising funds for Id-Dar tal-Providenza in Malta). Previous community roles include Treasurer for the Maltese Cultural Association of NSW, Secretary for the Maltese Community Council of NSW, and Secretary for the Past Pupils and Friends of Don Bosco NSW. All voluntary positions.

Miriam also volunteers as the coordinator of the MCC Radio Team and produces and presents two, one-hour, weekly Maltese programmes on community radio station 2GLF in South Western Sydney. Miriam is also the Group Leader for one of the MCC seniors groups and assists with other MCC groups and activities. Miriam works closely with her MCC committee, as well as with the Administrator for the MCC Maltese Language School of NSW, and the MCC Community Worker, aligning with the aims of the MCC, to preserve and promote Maltese identity, culture, heritage and language for all Maltese, by birth and descent, in NSW.

Miriam has extensive corporate work experience in hardware retailing, retail management, administration, staff training, quality assurance, data management and purchasing, spanning a career of nearly forty years.



Antoine Mangion (NSW Australia)

Born and raised in Australia, Antoine Mangion has long been involved in Sydney's Maltese community. He is currently Vice-President of the Maltese Community Council of NSW and Treasurer of La Valette Social Centre. Previously, he was President of Maltese Concert Band NSW where he continues to participate as a band-member playing the tenor saxophone.

After completing a Bachelor of Social Sciences with Honours, Antoine worked in an advocacy role as a Policy and Research Officer at a pensioners' association.

After some time he returned to university to complete a Graduate Diploma in Teaching, but ended up remaining at university to undertake a PhD while working as an academic tutor and research assistant in the field of education.

Government to mark 50 years as a Republic with 'L-Istorja, Int' celebrations in Valletta

'L-Istorja, Int' (History, You), will be the theme for the 50th anniversary celebrations for Malta's Republic Day

'L-Istorja, Int' (History, You), will be the theme for the 50th anniversary celebrations for Malta's Republic Day.

Making the announcement during a Wednesday

morning press conference, Culture Minister Owen Bonnici said the spectacle highlights will be an audio-visual spectacle held on 13, 14 and 15 December at St George's Square in Valletta. A projection on the President's Palace façade in Valletta will be part of the spectacle.

Bonnici said the theme centres around reminding people that that are part of the achievements Malta realised when it became a Republic.

"While these activities will be an ideal occasion to celebrate this important anniversary, they are also an invitation for every Maltese and Gozitan to work together, hand in hand, to participate in the next chapter of our country's history," he said.

The minister also announced that as part of the celebrations, an educational campaign will be launched in the coming days to highlight memorable achievements for the country since its became a Republic.

1. **The Birth of the Republic (1974):** Relive the moment Malta declared itself a republic, charting a course toward self-governance and independence.

MELLIEħA WORLD WAR II SHELTERS

Mellieħa, Malta

These purpose-built WWII air raid shelters, which run half a kilometre under the town of Mellieħa, are among the longest in Malta.

When World War II started, the islands of [Malta](#) in the centre of the Mediterranean Sea were not immediately targeted by the Axis powers, even though the islands were a British colony and the British military maintained a major presence on the islands.



Then, on June 10, 1940, [Italy](#) formally declared war on the Allies, and Axis planes immediately began to bomb Malta. The attacks would continue for three years until Allied forces were able to launch invasions of Sicily and the Italian mainland.

The civilians in Malta were initially unprepared for the bombings, and when they discovered that the masonry of their homes would not withstand the bombings, the people sought refuge in many of the archipelago's natural caves (such as [Għar Dalam](#)) or pre-existing man-made tunnels (such as the [tunnels built by the Knights of St. John in Valletta](#) or the [catacombs in Rabat](#)). Over time, though, people dug new tunnels to protect themselves from the bombs.

One of the longest World War II bomb shelters in Malta was dug in the community of Mellieħa at the north end of the island of Malta. A group of diggers started creating this tunnel in July 1941, and it would eventually stretch to half a kilometre long. The tunnels could house not only the 3,842 people of Mellieħa itself but also 1,117 people displaced from other parts of the island. Each person was allocated a total of two square feet, but individual families could apply to dig their own private rooms off of the main tunnels. Additionally, the tunnels included a maternity hospital and clinic as well as a section that was used to store works of art from the Valletta Museum.

At the beginning of the 21st century, the tunnels underwent restoration work, and in 2004, they opened as a museum. Cases near the entrance display examples of gas masks and digging tools from the WWII era, and a couple of the rooms in the tunnels have been decorated to show what they looked like during the war. A few mannequins scattered throughout the shelter and a movie projector at the end of one corridor provide some additional life in the tunnels. Other sections, however, are simply long corridors of bare rock. Overall, visitors to these shelters should come away with some sense of the bleak experiences of the people who survived for years hiding from Italian and German bombers within these tunnels.



MALTA POLICE SALUTE MEMORY OF LATE CONSTABLE ROGER DEBATTISTA

The Malta Police Force yesterday commemorated the ex-PC 949 [Roger Debattista](#), who tragically lost his life 23 years ago whilst on duty.

On November 12th 2001, Roger made the sacrifice during a bank hold-up in Ta' Farsina Qormi to protect the people present.

A father of two, Debattista noted three armed robbers making their way towards the entrance and tried to lock the door.

However, one of the robbers shot in his direction, with the bullet going through the door and hitting the constable. The robber, later identified as Andy Calleja, aimed and shot at Debattista, killing him. 'Mario Borg, Ian Galdes and Mark Falzon were charged with the armed robbery. Borg and Falzon were sentenced to five years and Galdes to seven years imprisonment. Andy Calleja was charged for the cold-blooded murder and the armed robbery amongst other charges. He was sentenced to life imprisonment, confirmed on appeal in 2004.'

Members from the police corp gathered at the bust erected in Ta' Farsina to honour his memory.

'Despite the ultimate price Roger paid in the line of duty, his mother's gentle look and heartfelt words remind us why we serve. Her strength and grace give us the motivation to keep following his footsteps of bravery and dedication.'

CHILD MIGRANT MEMORIAL AT THE MIGRATION MUSEUM – ADELAIDE, SOUTH AUSTRALIA

The sculpture commemorates the British child migrants who were removed from the homeland and families and transported to South Australia between 1912 and 1967. Some of the child migrants were from Malta.

In the years following World War Two, a popular immigration slogan was 'the child, the best immigrant'. They constituted a particularly attractive category of migrant because they were seen to assimilate more easily, were more adaptable, had a long working life ahead and could be cheaply housed in dormitory style accommodation.

Between 1947 and 1953 over 3200 children migrated to Australia under approved schemes. About 100 of these children were Maltese while the remainder came from the United Kingdom. Other European countries were asked if they would like to participate in the child migration scheme but they declined. There were over 30 homes approved by the Commonwealth for the housing of child migrants. Most of these were run by voluntary and religious organisations.

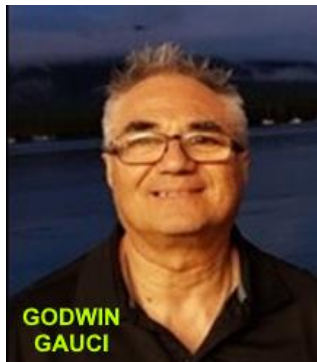
