President Biden Awards Presidential Medal of Freedom with Distinction to Pope Francis



President Biden spoke with His Holiness Pope Francis and named him as a recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom with Distinction. The Presidential Medal of Freedom is the Nation's highest civilian honour, presented to individuals who have made

exemplary contributions to the prosperity, values, or security of the United States, world peace, or other significant societal, public or private endeavours. This is the first time that President Biden has awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom with Distinction.

Citation:

As a young man, Jorge Bergoglio sought a career in science before faith led him to a life with the Jesuits. For decades, he served the voiceless and vulnerable across Argentina. As Pope Francis, his mission of serving the poor has never ceased. A loving pastor, he joyfully answers children's questions about God. A challenging teacher, he commands us to fight for peace and protect the planet. A welcoming leader, he reaches out to different faiths. The first pope from the Southern Hemisphere, Pope Francis is unlike any who came before. Above all, he is the People's Pope – a light of faith, hope, and love that shines brightly across the world.

This marks the second time a Pope has received the Presidential Medal of Freedom. On June 4, 2004, President George W. Bush presented the award to Pope John Paul II during a Vatican visit, recognizing his tireless advocacy for peace and human dignity.

Education activist Malala returns to a region in crisis

Islamabad (AFP) – Twelve years after she was evacuated out of Pakistan as a badly wounded schoolgirl, Malala Yousafzai has returned to her home country at a critical time for girls' education.

"For her, it is a homecoming to a region that shaped who she is today, but also a reminder of the work still left unfinished," Yousafzai's

friend and fellow rights activist Nighat Dad told AFP.

Millions more families are living in poverty while more than a third of children are still out of school, as the cash-strapped state grapples with cycles of political chaos and resurging militancy.

In neighbouring Afghanistan, the Taliban have returned to power and imposed an austere interpretation of Islamic law that includes banning girls from studying at secondary school and university. This weekend, 27-year-old Yousafzai was the guest of honour at a global summit on girls' education in Islamic nations hosted by Islamabad, where she called on leaders to stand up for Muslim girls.

"Her presence in Pakistan during such a time is a message to those in power: the fight for education cannot be silenced, whether it's in the Swat Valley or across the border in Afghanistan," Dad added.

In 2012 at the age of 15, Yousafzai was shot in the head while on her way home from school by a Pakistan Taliban militant incensed by an education blog she wrote.

At the time, an insurgency against the government had spread to her remote, picturesque Swat Valley and militants had ordered girls to stay home.

Across the frontier, the war raged between NATO forces and the Afghan Taliban, a separate but closely linked group from the Pakistan Taliban which flourished in the border regions.

WHAT IS FUTSAL?



Futsal is a football-based sport played on a hardcourt like a basketball court, smaller than a football pitch, and mainly indoors. It has similarities to five-a-side football and indoor football.

Futsal is played between two teams of five players each, one of whom is the goalkeeper. Unlimited substitutions are permitted. Unlike some other forms of indoor football, it is played on a hard-court surface marked by lines; walls or boards are not used. It is played with a smaller, harder, lower-bounce ball than association football. The surface, ball and rules favour ball control and

passing in small spaces. The game also emphasizes improvisation, creativity and technique.

Futsal in Australia is governed by the Football Federation Australia and its state-based futsal associations. Australia has played in seven FIFA Futsal World Cups. Each State in Australia runs the Professional and Semi-Professional futsal leagues independently,

Subsequently, he was extended an invitation to showcase his abilities on a televised platform, where he captivated audiences with his rendition of "Blue Suede Shoes," one of his favored Elvis tracks. Entranced by the King's magnetic presence and musical virtuosity, young Josuel found himself inexorably drawn into the enchanting realm of Rock 'n' Roll. Little did he realize at the time, that this pivotal moment would lay the foundation for his illustrious career trajectory.

Elvis Presley's Passion for Jewellery.

Elvis Presley was born on January 8, 1935 in Tupelo Tennessee, He and his parents moved to Memphis in 1948. Elvis' music influences were the pop and country music of the time. He was influenced by the black R&B he absorbed on historic Beale Street as a Memphis teenager. In 1954 he began his singing career with the Sun Record label. By 1956, he was an international singing sensation. He starred in 33 successful films and made history with his television appearances and specials live concert performances on tour and in Las Vegas.

His talent, good looks, sensuality, charisma, and good humour endeared him to millions, as did the humility and human kindness he demonstrated throughout his life. Known the world over by his first name, he is regarded as one of the most important figures of twentieth century popular culture.

There are thousands of Elvis pictures, CDs, books and films, some very rare, which have inspired thousands of tribute artists. There is also a huge range of Elvis jewellery – Elvis rings, pendants and coins, and of course the King's famous TCB pendant.

Nearly every country in the world has an official Elvis Presley fan club. Some of the legacy he has left with us will be there for ever: his jewellery (such as rings, pendants and coins), jump suits, sunglasses and Elvis memorabilia, and of course not forgetting the famous gold TCB pendant. Elvis died at his Memphis home, Graceland, on August 16, 1977 which will always be remembered by us all at Graceland Elvis.

Bringing Community Together Through Story

I was recently invited by my local library, Umina Beach in NSW, to do a free author talk on my novel, *The Maltese Web*, a thriller set in Malta. It was booked out and I was thrilled that forty people attended to hear me talk about Malta. The event brought together a community of Maltese people I didn't know existed in and around my suburb. It was delightful to receive amazingly positive feedback and hear

people exchanging their own memories. I was very appreciative of people wanting to share their stories of Malta with me and other people commenting that my talk had inspired them to put a visit on their bucket list.

We discussed what inspired me to set the novel in Malta and how I wove the history, food, culture and landscape into my writing. It was a joy sharing my affection for life on the island and my obsession with learning about the Maltese past and keeping up with the present.

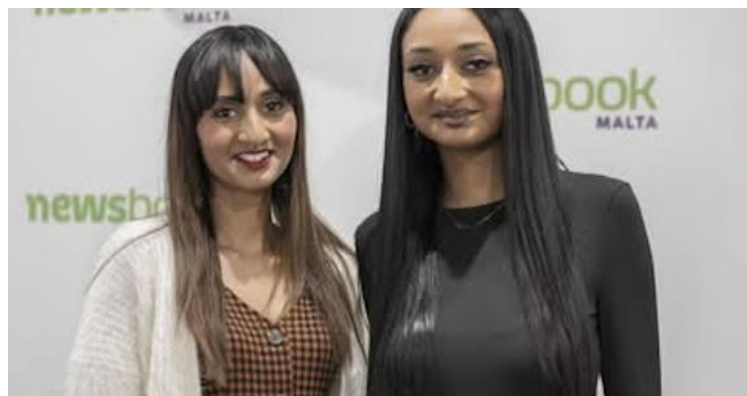
What created a ripple amongst the audience, was a brief presentation when I shared our memories from the time we lived in Malta and from our many visits, and how I used it to infuse the book with my observations about living in Malta. The smiles and excited exclamations as they recognised Maltese towns, icons and food echoed my own feelings about Malta.

There was a keen interest in the challenge of weaving Maltese life into the story. It was a challenge I said I relished, of writing about the feeling of being immersed in Malta. There were nods in the audience as I spoke of writing about the taste of the pastizzi, the view when driving amongst the green fields or travelling along narrow roads surrounded by the beige stone buildings that funnelled traffic through townships. I emphasised how I liked to illustrate the elements of Malta that are not in the tourist brochures such as the white and beige buildings that dot the island and hug the coastline overlooking the waters painted in shades of blue. In contrast with a tourist's brochure portraying the blue sea surrounding Malta as a placid pond in which to dip to escape the scorching summer heat I wrote of how it could during winter, viciously slam into the island of rock swamping roads, walkways and small villages.

The Maltese Web, is the story of Marica Debono, a financial investigator who is trying to stop Russian criminals attempting to launder dirty money. The story is about Marica's fight to rebuild her career, while juggling a tense family situation, and in doing her job she uncovers a web of deceit, which leads her to discover an uncomfortable link to her father's business. Risking everything, can she save the island and those she loves? It is available on Amazon in kindle or paperback.

Sharing my story of how I crafted the novel with the attentive crowd who were a mixture of Maltese and non-Maltese gave me a special thrill. People smiled with rekindled memories, and many commented that they had learnt something new about Malta.

I was encouraged by the attendees to do an event to help other Maltese communities come together, so their families and friends could share a similar experience. RACISM IN MALTA

Adopted Maltese sisters fear for children's future

From childhood bullying to workplace prejudice, sisters speak out against racism in Malta

Whitney Camilleri, a young Maltese woman adopted from Pakistan, shared the profound hurt she felt as a mother when her son was targeted by a racist remark.

While playing in a local park, other children approached him, and one shouted, “Those Indians or whatever, I hate them.”

In an interview with [Newsbook Malta](http://www.newsbook.com), Whitney and her sister Oriana opened up about the racism they've faced, the challenges of their upbringing, and their fears for their children's future. They highlighted the bullying experienced by many adopted Indian and Pakistani children in Malta, urging awareness and caution, particularly among parents whose words can influence their children's attitudes. “We never hear such comments about Italians, Russians, or Bulgarians, but when it comes to darker skin, the argument of overpopulation suddenly arises,” they observed.

Whitney recounted a lonely childhood marred by constant bullying. “From kindergarten to senior school, I couldn't make friends. Those who did befriend me were ashamed of me.” She was often called “Black” and mocked for her appearance. At school, she spent breaks alone, was always the last chosen for group activities, and endured teachers' inaction.

Art became her solace. Her art teacher would open the classroom for her during breaks, offering her a therapeutic escape. Still, the relentless bullying took its toll, leading to learning difficulties and depression. “Children aren't supposed to get depressed, but I did,” she admitted.

Oriana's experience was different but equally painful. Her friends would greet her with, “The black one is here,” and she struggled to understand why they subjected her to such cruelty. Today, she keeps a close circle of three friends and her boyfriend, avoiding the toxicity of larger social groups.

‘We hear racist comments all day long‘

Both sisters agree that racism has worsened despite awareness campaigns. Oriana, who works with carers, hears racist remarks daily. “Even when we're doing our jobs with dignity, we face hurtful comments,” she said. Many Maltese are shocked when they hear her speak fluent Maltese and retract their words in embarrassment. Her Indian colleagues, however, often endure such treatment silently, fearing retaliation. Whitney referenced the tragic case of a bus driver who died in a traffic accident just before Christmas. “When the accident happened, they mocked him, saying Indians can't drive. Then, when he died, the same people wrote comments like ‘rest in peace’ and ‘poor man.’ The hypocrisy was painful to witness.”

As mothers, Whitney and Oriana fear their children will face the same prejudice they endured. “No child deserves the suffering we went through,” they said, calling for a society rooted in acceptance. They expressed gratitude to their adoptive family, who raised them with love and affection, and hope their children will grow up assertive and unafraid to embrace their differences.

GREGORY CARUANA

Remembering Assistant Steward Gregory Caruana, Born on 17th February 1918 in Qormi, Malta. On his 18th birthday, Gregory joined the Royal Navy. His Service Number is E/LX 22029. Gregory served aboard the **HMS Glorious** for four-plus years. At the young age of 22, Gregory's life was tragically cut short on 08 June 1940, a testament to the sacrifices made by those in service during wartime. His memory is commemorated on the Plymouth Naval Memorial in Devon, where his name is honored on Panel 42, Column 3. Gregory was the Son of Carmnu and Vittoria Caruana and brother of John (Ganni), Carmenu, Theresa (my Mother), Rosario (Zaru), Antoninu (Tony), Censinu (Vince), and Salvatore (Sam). Gregory's legacy symbolizes courage and dedication. His commitment to duty and the sacrifices he made for his country are deeply respected and remembered, reflecting the profound impact of his service.

HMS GLORIOUS



On the 8th June 1940 HMS. Glorious along with her two destroyer escorts HMS. Ardent and HMS. Acasta were sunk in Norwegian waters. A total of 1531 men lost their lives on the three ships making it one of the worst naval tragedies during WW2 for England and Malta. On board HMS. Glorious 40 Maltese men along with more than 10 English ratings who had made Malta their home died whilst serving on her.

Shockwaves hit Malta when on the 10th June news reached us of the sinking. However this was soon overshadowed by the news that Italy had entered the war on the German side and declared war on England and its allies, which included Malta. Fear was felt throughout the island with war looming on the horizon. The next day at 6.30am Malta suffered its first victims of the war when the Italian Air Force dropped their bombs and a pregnant mother and her two children were killed in Pieta. The story of the sinking was now almost forgotten, except by the relatives of those men. Malta now was suffering the horrors of war and there was little time to reflect on past tragedies.

The mystery behind this tragedy arises from the fact that no clear answers were given to the public in England as to why Glorious was allowed to leave the convoy and sail on its own. To make matters worse the government slapped a 100 Year Secrecy Act on all documents related to this story. **HMS. Glorious is the only aircraft carrier to have the 100 Year Secrecy Act imposed on it.** This added fuel to a conspiracy theory that was going around at that time and is still the most believed theory of them all. Two evacuation convoys were to leave Narvik in Norway hoping to be as secretive as possible to ensure minimal loss of ships and lives. But, along with this convoy, but travelling separately, was H.M.S. Devonshire carrying on it, the Norwegian Royal Family, as well as the Norwegian parliament and Norwegian gold bullion. This theory has the Glorious being sacrificed in order for the Devonshire and the two convoys to reach Scapa Flow in Scotland without mishap. This they did as no one was attacked during their journey to Scapa Flow.

Maltese Traditional “Number 8” Shaped Biscuits

These Maltese biscuits are one of the most favourite biscuits in Malta. They still are as among the Maltese living Broad. We miss them whilst living here away from our homeland.

So obviously I have been asked to download a recipe of these special biscuits.

The recipe is very similar to Qagħaq tal-Ġunġlien (Maltese Biscuit Rings with Sesame Seeds) with some ingredient changes and also, this time we used a food processor. Needless to say, there is less mess in the kitchen and takes less time to prepare!! It is quite easy to shape a number 8, actually easier than you had thought.

Using this method I always get equally shaped (well approximately) finished products. So if you miss these biscuits here is how to make 10 of them first thing on a Saturday morning. You can dunk these in hot tea or coffee, that's how we like them :)

INGREDIENTS.

- 250g plain flour
- 85g caster sugar
- 1 ½ teaspoons baking powder
- 1 egg
- ½ teaspoon ground aniseed
- Pinch ground cloves
- 90g salted butter, at room temperature, cut into cubes
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1 tablespoon orange flower water - Ilma zahar (if not available add another tablespoon of water)
- Grated zest of 1 orange
- Sesame seeds

METHOD

1. Preheat the oven to 180°C.
2. If you are using a food processor, start by adding the flour, sugar, spices and baking powder into the food processor and pulse for a few minutes. If not using a processor add the dry ingredients in a large bowl and mix well. Add the butter and blend until all butter has been incorporated into the flour. If using your hands, mix the butter in with your fingertips until mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.
3. In a small bowl beat the egg and mix in the orange zest, water, orange flower water and oil. Mix well. Add to the dry ingredients whilst food processor is running and blend until the dough comes together. Again if using your hands, add the wet ingredients to the dry ingredients mix well until you get a soft dough.
4. Divide the dough into 10 equal sized balls (about 50g each), a bit bigger than golf balls and roll into thin long sausage-like shapes, about 30cm long. Shape into a number 8 and carefully transfer into a plate with sesame seeds turning over to cover both sides with the seeds. Place on a tray lined with greaseproof paper and bake in the preheated oven for about 20-22 minutes.
5. Let cool down and serve with tea or coffee. Enjoy!!





Butterflies in Malta

In recent years, butterfly diversity in the Maltese Islands appears to have fluctuated significantly. While a new species has appeared (accidentally introduced via horticulture) and another (North African migrant) increased in number, others have evidently suffered a considerable decline across their local distribution range.

Some argue that this is due to changes in the climatic regime, notably, that an increase in hot and dry weather conditions on the islands has influenced local butterfly populations. Another possible explanation could be related to habitat impoverishment, as a result of land-use changes and increased urbanisation, with the result of increased fragmentation of rural landscapes.

Other major threats include an indiscriminate use of pesticides and exploitation of species, particularly for commercial reasons. This study aims to assess the local situation and identify as well as evaluate strategies towards conservation of butterfly species in the Maltese Islands. Butterflies were monitored within nine pre-determined sites; their abundance was assessed by means of transect counts along a route of 300 metres. A vegetation survey was also conducted in all the sites and data concerning the abundance of vegetation was estimated along the same transects.

Fifty-five percent of the total number of butterfly species, known to occur in the Maltese Islands, was recorded during the study. The results of the study indicate that valley systems harbour more butterfly individuals than garrigue sites ($p < 0.05$), however, garrigue sites record the highest value for the total number of butterfly species encountered.

The study shows a positive correlation between species richness of butterflies and plants, however, results prove, that, butterfly diversity, does not always depend on the diversity of plant species present along the transect route. Thus, the findings of the present study suggest that butterflies respond not only to adult food resources but are also influenced by the landscape context. An urgent strategy for conserving butterflies in the Maltese Islands is recommended, with a view to address the various issues and problems that are affecting the decline of butterflies.

As a first step, a monitoring plan that involves various sites across the islands, should be formulated. In addition, local habitats must be assessed and evaluated to determine whether these merit any special protection in terms of butterfly fauna.

Other recommended conservation actions include: identifying food plants and specific habitats for subsequent conservation; raising awareness; promoting butterfly-friendly activities and projects; and providing an effective education scheme. Such a strategy could help thwart imminent extinctions and restore a countryside rich in butterflies.

Pawlu Mizzi

Father of Maltese books

Born in Rabat, Gozo in October, 1929 and died in August 2019 Pawlu Mizzi will always be known as the father of Maltese books. He studied at the Gozo seminary and the Royal University of Malta, where he obtained a BA and later a diploma in librarianship.

Throughout his life he taught at various schools and also served as the librarian at MCAST. Between 1948 and 1962 Mizzi was the correspondent in Gozo for Allied Newspapers. He also served as

the director of *Il-Ħajja* and was also the director of the Mediterranean Film Studios. Mizzi had collaborated in the filming of such films as *Cristoforo Colombo* and *Pirates*.

Among his vast body of work, Pawlu Mizzi will be most remembered for setting *Klabb Kotba Maltin* in 1970 and later for the foundation of Midsea Publications. *Klabb Kotba Maltin* was a pioneer in the sector of Maltese books and books about Malta. The first book he published was *Il-Gaġġa* by Frans Sammut in 1971. Mizzi was also the editor of *Heritage*, the encyclopaedia of Maltese heritage, culture and civilisation.

Among the most important books published by *Klabb Kotba Maltin* is the New Testament – the first popular Bible written in modern Maltese, *Il-Miklem* by Erin Serracino Inglott, Ġużè Aquilina's dictionary, a collection of poems by national poet Dun Karm Psaila, edited by Prof Oliver Friggieri and *Rajt Malta Tinbidel* by Herbert Ganado. Pawlu Mizzi also published several of his own personal publications including *Il-Parroċċa t'Għawdex: Studju kulturali ta' epoka 1432-1689* and a series of legends about Malta and Gozo. In 1992 Mizzi was given the Medal for *Qadi tar-Repubblika* and in 1994, he was appointed a Knight of the *Sacra Ordina Militare Constantiniana de San Jorge*.

Over the last three decades, IMLI’s work has contributed to the establishment of a cadre of experts in international maritime law who are able to prepare, review and advise on the implementation of maritime laws and regulations.

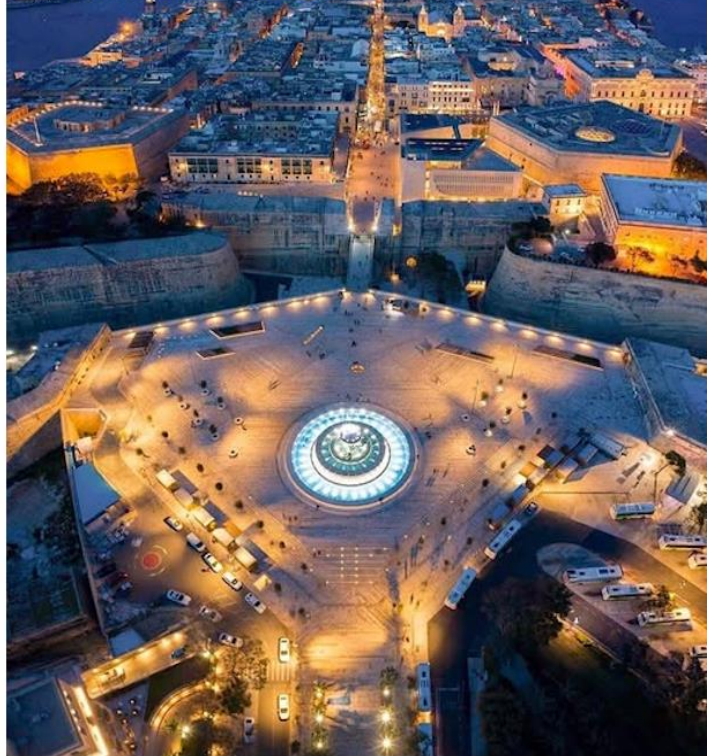
