JAKE BRIMMER DREAMT OF PLAYING FOR THE SOCCEROOS, BUT NOW 2022 JOHNNY WARREN MEDAL WINNER JAKE BRIMMER HAS PLEDGED HIS INTERNATIONAL ALLEGIANCE TO MALTA

The former Australian youth international once adjudged the A-League's best player has switched his international allegiance to Malta. Auckland FC midfielder Jake Brimmer, who won the Johnny Warren Medal in 2022 during his time with Melbourne Victory, has had his "change of association" request approved by FIFA.

The 27-year-old former Liverpool youth player who was born in Melbourne of Maltese Parents, has represented Australia at under-17 and under-20 levels but hasn't played for the Socceroos, who are currently coached by his former Victory mentor Tony Popovic.

Having taken advantage of his Maltese heritage, Brimmer can now play for Malta, whose next match is a FIFA World Cup qualifier on September 5 against Lithuania in Kaunas.

"Obviously growing up I wanted to play for the Socceroos, but I'm 27 now and perhaps that chance has passed me by, and this is a chance for me to play international football and be seen in Europe, which will hopefully help my chances of going back over there to play club football," Brimmer said.

"I discussed things with my family and we felt this was the best decision for me.

"I'm entering the prime years of my career, and feel this is the right time to do this, and I'm happy with my decision."

Brimmer said the Malta Football Association first approached him about changing allegiances after his Johnny Warren Medal-winning season.

However, at the time, Brimmer was still intent on playing for the Socceroos, believing his form at the time warranted selection in Australia's senior team.

But having constantly been overlooked, Brimmer is set to now follow in the footsteps of former Central Coast Mariners pair John Hutchinson and Trent Buhagiar, who switched allegiances from Australia to play senior football for Malta.

Brimmer, who started his A-League career with Perth Glory, left the Victory at the end of the 2023-24 season to become a foundation player with Auckland, and was part of the Black Knights squad that won the Premier's Plate in the club's maiden A-League campaign.

He came off the bench in Auckland's 4-0 Australia Cup round-of-32 win over NPL Queensland club Gold Coast Knights on Tuesday night at Carrara.

AMALGAMATING TWO INCORPORATED SOCIETIES

During the last few years, we have witnessed the closing down of several clubs and associations because of the diminishing number of members of the Maltese communities around the world. It was suggested that instead of dissolving our groups we might consider amalgamating these precious societies that were the backbone of the Maltese living abroad for decades.

Amalgamating two societies involves merging two incorporated associations into a single new entity. This process is used to combine resources, assets, and members to form a new, independent incorporated association. It's a way to streamline operations and potentially increase effectiveness by sharing resources and expertise.

Here's a more detailed explanation:

What is Amalgamation?

- Amalgamation is a specific process for incorporated associations (registered in the same state or territory) to combine into one.
- It's different from a merger, which is a broader term and may involve different legal structures.
- In an amalgamation, the individual associations essentially cease to exist, and their assets, liabilities, and operations are transferred to the newly formed association.

How it Works:

- 1. Special Resolutions:** Each of the merging associations must hold a meeting and pass a special resolution approving the amalgamation.
- 2. Application:** Once the resolutions are passed, the associations can apply to the relevant state regulator (e.g., [Consumer Protection WA](#) or [SA.GOV.AU](#) in Australia).
- 3. New Entity:** The regulator then cancels the incorporation of the individual associations and registers the new amalgamated entity.
- 4. Transfer of Assets and Liabilities:** All assets, liabilities, and operations of the original associations are transferred to the new entity.
- 5. New Name and Rules:** The amalgamated association may adopt a new name or the name of one of the original associations, and new rules (constitution) will be created for the new entity.

Benefits of Amalgamation:

- **Streamlined Operations:** Combining resources can eliminate duplication and improve efficiency.
- **Shared Expertise:** Amalgamation allows for the sharing of knowledge, skills, and experience between the two organizations.
- **Increased Effectiveness:** By working together, organizations can potentially achieve greater impact and reach.
- **Cost Savings:** Sharing resources can lead to reduced costs for things like administration, fundraising, and operational expenses.
- **Access to New Opportunities:**

Amalgamation can open up new opportunities for collaboration, funding, and service delivery.

Things to Consider:

- **Due Diligence:** Thorough due diligence is crucial to assess the financial health, legal standing, and operational practices of each organization before proceeding with the amalgamation.
- **Legal Advice:** It's important to seek legal advice to ensure the amalgamation process is carried out correctly and in compliance with relevant legislation.

KING ROGER 1 – KING OF SICILY AND MALTA



The title "King of Sicily and Malta" refers to the historical rulers of the Kingdom of Sicily, which included the Maltese islands as a dependency for several centuries. From 1194 to 1530, the Kingdom of Sicily's rule over Malta led to the gradual Latinization and Europeanization of the islands. The Norman conquest of Sicily, initiated by Roger I, eventually extended to Malta, with Roger I being the first to establish Norman rule there in 1091.

Here's a more detailed

breakdown:

- **Norman Rule:**

Roger I of Sicily conquered Malta in 1091, and his successors, including Roger II, continued to exert control.

- **Kingdom of Sicily's Influence:**

The Kingdom of Sicily, which included Malta, was a significant power in the Mediterranean region for centuries.

- **Latinization:**

Under Sicilian rule, Malta experienced a shift from Arab cultural influence to a more European, specifically Latin, one.

- **End of Sicilian Rule:**

In 1530, the Holy Roman Emperor Charles V granted Malta to the Knights Hospitaller, ending the direct rule of the Kingdom of Sicily.

- **Counts of Malta:**

While the Kings of Sicily held overall authority, various individuals were appointed as Counts of Malta during this period, including Margaritus of Brindisi and others.

Malta Once Had a King? The Forgotten Royal Chapter Explained

Back in the 1500s, Malta was ruled by Spain, which was one of the most powerful kingdoms in Europe. The Spanish king at the time, Charles V, decided to hand Malta over to the Knights of St John


This was not a gift without conditions. In exchange, the Knights were required to remain loyal to the Crown of Sicily and pay a symbolic annual tribute. That tribute came in the form of a live falcon, presented each year on All Saints' Day.

Although Malta did not have a resident king living on the island, the King of Sicily held sovereignty over the territory. In 1530, that king was Charles V, who also held the title of Holy Roman Emperor. His rule over Malta was largely symbolic, but legally, he was considered the island's monarch.

The Knights of St John governed Malta on the king's behalf. They were responsible for defence, administration, and justice. While they held most of the power locally, they were technically still ruling under the authority of the King of Sicily.

This arrangement continued for over two centuries. However, by the late 18th and early 19th centuries, Malta's political situation changed. Following the arrival of the British in 1800, Malta's connection to royal rule through Sicily and Spain came to an end.



L-Isqof wera t-tama tiegħu li dan il-ktejjeb iservi biex hafna nies, b'mod speċjali l-istudenti tagħna jagħrfu aktar is-sbuħija ta' Gesu' preżenti fil-ħobż tal-Ewkaristija. historical Maltese Falcon was a real peregrine falcon presented annually by the Knights of Malta to the Holy Roman Emperor as a form of tribute. The fictional Maltese Falcon, popularized by Dashiell Hammett's novel and the 1941 film starring Humphrey

Bogart, is a jewel-encrusted statuette that becomes the object of a treasure hunt.

Here's a breakdown:

- **The Real Maltese Falcon:**

In 1530, the Knights of St. John (also known as the Knights Hospitaller) were granted the islands of Malta by Emperor Charles V. One of the conditions was an annual tribute of a single falcon, presented to the Viceroy of Sicily, representing the Emperor. This falcon was a symbol of loyalty and fealty.

- **The Fictional Maltese Falcon:**

Dashiell Hammett's novel and the subsequent film tell a story about a hunt for a priceless, jewel-encrusted falcon statuette. The statuette is a fictionalized version of the historical tribute, with added embellishments and a narrative centered around a treasure hunt and the characters involved in pursuing it.

The 1941 film, *The Maltese Falcon*, directed by John Huston, is a classic example of the film noir genre. It follows private detective Sam Spade's involvement in the search for the statuette and the dangerous characters who are also after it.

This is a very interesting story about my brother-in-law Antony Jackson who was born in Kangaroo Island, South Australia. He is the husband of my sister Bernadette. He has joined the Maltese family back in the early 70's and enjoys going to many Maltese functions. He joined the Maltese Senior Citizens club a few years ago, and last year he was elected the Vice-President of the club.


He Left Kangaroo Island when he was a young man and went to the mainland securing a job with Simpson Pope a manufacturer of household goods and appliances, He was there for several years and one day, he said it was time to move on, so keeping that in mind, he joined the Adelaide Metro and became a bus driver.

He and his wife Bernadette had three daughters and one son, with six grandson which keeps him on his toes all the time. After a hard day's work driving a bus, he likes to go home and put his feet up and relax, not so, his greatest hobby is FISHING. He has bought himself a big boat, lots of rods and reels, lots of fishing equipment such as lures, hooks, sinkers, floats and hundreds of metres of line in many weight sizes.

He is so keen, that he finish work early 3am or 4am in the morning when it is still dark and everyone is still asleep, hooks up the boat to the car, picks up the thermos flask and some food, get some bait from the shed fridge, and off he goes fishing. He has joined a fishing club, The Northern District Anglers Club, part of the South Australian Piscatorial Council Inc. where he goes fishing with the club all over South Australia. He has won many trophies and in 2022 was declared Veteran Angler of the Year, and in 2023 he was awarded Fisherman of the Year by the club. He is one of the top two people, taking out the most fish caught, the heaviest catch, and many more. He is now retired from driving buses, so he can go fishing any day any time. He also takes out his grandson fishing during the school holidays. Below are few of the many trophies and awards he has received.

Antony also competes in the Australian Angling Association Competitions. Mostly in the Freshwater Competition at Cobdogla on the Murray River and the Rock and Beach at the bottom of York Peninsula. As an individual Antony has been runner up in the Freshwater events and his team has come first many times in both the Freshwater and Rock and Beach competition, in the Men's Team Events

About The Event *“Air raid warning, air raid warning. Shut your doors and windows.”*

The Rediffusion blared out in English and then in Maltese, at 6:55am on the morning of 11 June 1940. This was the first of many times we would hear that warning. The day our lives changed. Margaret Staples was nine years old at the beginning of 1939 when her father was posted to the British colony of Malta with the Royal Engineers. Swimming every day, with blue skies and balmy weather; Margaret and her siblings thought they were in paradise.

Everything changed when the Second World War broke out. Hitler wanted to take control of Malta for its strategic position, right in the middle of the Mediterranean. To this end, the Axis powers dropped more bombs on this tiny island than anywhere else on the planet. When that didn't work, they decided to sink all the supply ships going...

This is Margaret's story of survival, told by her daughter Linda.



HOW MALTA'S STREETS, VILLAGES AND LAWS STILL REFLECT BRITISH RULE

Malta's British legacy is still visible today in its language, education system, architecture, and



political structure. English is one of Malta's official languages, and the education system is heavily influenced by the British model, with English often used as the primary language of instruction in schools. Many buildings, particularly those of a civic or military nature, reflect Neoclassical or British colonial architectural styles. Furthermore, Malta's


parliamentary system and legal framework are largely based on British models.

Here's a more detailed look at the British influence:

Language: English is one of Malta's two official languages, alongside Maltese. This is a direct result of British colonial rule. Most Maltese people are fluent in English, and it's widely used in government, education, and everyday life.

Education: The British introduced a curriculum and educational system that continues to influence Malta today. While Maltese is taught as a language, many schools, especially private and church-run institutions, use English as the primary language of instruction. University courses and scholarly literature also frequently draw on English sources.

Architecture: The British introduced Neoclassical architectural styles, which are evident in many buildings throughout the islands. Examples include the Main Guard building in St. George's Square in Valletta, and band clubs and municipal structures around Malta and Gozo. Forts, law courts, dockyards, and barracks also reflect British influence.



Political System: Malta's parliamentary system and legal framework are modeled after the British system. The parliament, law courts, and civil services are all based on British institutions.

Other Remnants: Red telephone booths, although less common now, are still visible as a reminder of the British period. The British also established military barracks, some of which have been repurposed or refurbished for other uses.

Historical Context: Malta served as a strategic British stronghold in the Mediterranean, playing a key role in both World Wars. The islands were heavily involved in World War II, and were awarded the George Cross for the bravery of its citizens during the war. Malta gained independence in 1964

but remains part of the Commonwealth.



HAMRUN CLUB SYDNEY

CUTE MALTESE TERMS

PUPA / PUPU - The Maltese version of *doll*, usually used when calling or encouraging children.

"EJJA PUPA, L-AHHAR FTIT" - any adult trying to convince a little girl to finish her broccoli/homework.

HANINI - **"Darling"** No, not the spreadable cheese or a boat. Hanini is usually reserved for beings of great cuteness (i.e. all animals and some babies). "Hanini! Irid wiehed bħalu!" - any human watching a video of a baby sloth.

TEŻOR - **"Treasure"** Although this term of endearment hasn't been widely used since the knights roamed freely through our streets (in the flesh, not spectral form), calling anyone a treasure is an endearing thing indeed.

QALBI - **"My Heart"** Although it lacks any sense when translated literally, 'my heart' is one of Malta's most common (and sweetest) terms of endearment used for children, friends and significant others. **Things get dark when...**

It's used following a deep sigh. Nothing spells disappointment quite like a condescending look and a short 'qalbi...' **DUDU / DUDA** - **"Worm"** Although at face value calling someone a worm may not seem like the sweetest of terms, but it's probably

one of those that developed out of the love-you-so-much-it's-cool-if-we-insult-each-other school of thought.

SABIH / SABIHA - **"Hello beautiful!"** - not much room for offence here, right? Wrong. **Things get dark when** 'Eh' is tacked on the end, then it's suddenly 'sabiħ eh!' and morphs into one of the most sarcastic phrases ever. Also, if you're called a *sabiħ/a* in traffic, the other driver you just cut off is in no way exchanging pleasantries.

Other common terms are: **XBIN u SIEHBI** - **"mate"** **U EJJA HA MMORRU** - Come on, let's go.

ANĠLU (TIEGHI): This translates to "(my) angel" and can be used to address someone you find sweet and lovable.



MONUMENTS AT CASTILLE SQUARE – VALLETTA

One of the most beautiful buildings on Castille Square is Auberge de Castille, which was built in 1570 as the home of the **Sovereign Military and Hospitaller Order of St. John of Jerusalem**. Castille Square in Valletta, Malta, features several prominent monuments and statues, including those dedicated to Maltese Prime Ministers and historical figures. The square is also home to the Auberge de Castille, a significant Baroque building currently housing the Prime Minister's Office.

Monuments and Statues:

- **GORG BORG OLIVIER MONUMENT:** Located in front of the Stock Exchange building, this monument honours Gorg Borg Olivier, a former Prime Minister and leader of the Nationalist Party,
- **DOM MINTOFF MONUMENT:** Situated in Castille Square, this monument celebrates Dom Mintoff, another former Prime Minister, and his role in Malta's emancipation from colonial powers,
- **PAUL BOFFA MONUMENT:** A memorial statue dedicated to Maltese politician Paul Boffa.
- **KARMENU MIFSUD BONNICI:** Another monument will be erected at the square celebrating the life of the former Labour leader. He was prime minister from 1984 to 1987. He died in November 2022, aged 89.
- **Migration Summit Monument:** Erected on Castille Square to commemorate the 2015 Malta Summit on migration.
- **Other Notable Features:**
 - **Auberge de Castille:** This historic building, originally built in 1570, is a prime example of Baroque architecture and currently serves as the Prime Minister's Office.
 - **Central Bank of Malta:** The headquarters of the Central Bank of Malta is also located on Castille Square.
 - **Malta Stock Exchange:** The Stock Exchange building is another prominent structure in the square.
 - **St. James Cavalier:** A historic fortification that has been converted into a cultural centre.

Upper Barrakka – a beautiful garden adjacent to Castille square overlooking the Grand Harbour.

Never tell Nanna that you are living together. It's a mortal sin. Tell her you live separately. You only meet each other for coffee after Sunday Mass which you attend weekly without fail.

You will be made fun of – a lot

Tell your partner to think twice before telling any of your family members which parts of Malta you have visited today. Your pronunciation *will* be made fun of. And apparently the joke never gets old.

No, you don't need to remember who's who

This will all take years to sink in. Don't rush yourself. The list is endless to remember all the aunties, uncles, nieces and nephews etc..

There's no such thing as Maltese reservation

From physical invasion of personal space to unprecedented level of prying into your personal life – with Maltese families. Be prepared to tell them the whole story even if you have to exaggerate or twist the truth.

Flattery will get you everywhere

Even if you don't love pastizzi/bigillia/zalzett malti/hobż biz-zejt/Kinnie – pretend you do. It's an automatic "okay, you're in the club".

Take all the food that is offered to you

Just trust us on this one – it's better to leave a family BBQ feeling like you might explode than having to explain to a Maltese mother why you're not eating her food. She thinks that her food is not good enough for you and she will be offended.

You'll have inbuilt credibility

If there's one thing Maltese people are used to it's learning from foreigners who have conquered us. It won't be long before mum tells all the members of the family and neighbors how smart and sophisticated partner are. Yes, even after just meeting him/her once.

You'll feel right at home... Becoming part of a Maltese family is a bit like joining the Mafia. There's always someone looking out for you. Beware.

THE SWORD AND DAGGER OF GRAND MASTER DE LA VALETTE

Lost (& found) Maltese treasures: the sword & dagger of Grandmaster de la Valette

When even Malta's capital city bears his name, it's not surprising that the Maltese would make a treasure of anything that ever had a connection with Grandmaster de la Valette (1557-68).

Allegedly used during the Great Siege of 1565, some such treasures include three pieces of armour (the breastplate, backplate and falling buffe) held in the Palace Armoury in Valletta and the Grand Master's actual fighting sword used during the Great Siege, which is held at the chapel of Our Lady of Damascus within the Oratory of St Joseph at Vittoriosa.

La Valette's armour and fighting sword were reunited in 2017, the same year when his ceremonial dagger was on display in Malta on loan from the Louvre for the first time since 1798.

Napoleon's army had pilfered much of Malta's treasures. The clever Maltese set about painting their precious gold - often found in their churches - black, to stop them being stolen, but the Grandmaster's ceremonial sword and dagger had already been taken, never to return until almost 220 years later.

The ornamental sword and dagger, originally belonging to King Philip II of Spain, were gifted to the Grandmaster in recognition of de la Valette's illustrious victory over the Ottomans and Suleiman the Magnificent during the Great Siege of 1565 - a siege that could have forever altered the course of Europe's entire religious tradition and culture.

The sword and the dagger together make one set. The dagger, a poniard, was a parrying weapon used in conjunction with the sword, a mid-16th century rapier with a rich and elaborate hilt. The dagger is fashioned with a well-sized cross guard and side rings. It is decorated similarly to the sword, with cast and chiselled gold decorations highlighted with turquoise, blue, black, red and white enamel. Unfortunately, the original gold decorated girdle and sheath are long lost.

The sword and dagger were bequeathed to the Sovereign Order of the Knights of Malta upon the death of Grandmaster de la Valette. The sword and dagger were precious and iconic items in the Order's treasury that were annually paraded during the 8th September festivities for two centuries, until 1797.



When Napoleon's forces invaded Malta in 1798, the French took both items. The sword somehow found its way to Paris but Napoleon Bonaparte apparently took the dagger as a talisman and carried it with him. The dagger passed on to his son, upon Napoleon's death in 1821, and it was eventually presented to the Louvre in 1840 where it was first displayed in 1852.

Both items never left Paris for centuries after. But, interestingly, nobody in Paris really offered these historic items the prestige they deserve. If you had gone to the Louvre prior to 2017 - and searched for these treasures among the tens of thousands of exhibits - you would have been hard-pressed to find them, unless you knew where to look. They were kept in the Richelieu Wing, Floor 1, Louis VIX section: Objects d'Art – Decorative Arts, Room 25, .ish artist who made them, while guides at the famous palace just returned blank faces.

Thankfully, with Valletta being the European Capital of Culture 2018, the dagger and sword returned to a place where they could be properly appreciated: Malta, home of the Order of St John prior to Napoleon's invasion.

In actual fact, the sword and dagger never belonged to the Maltese. But Malta was the home of the Order of St John, and these were prized possessions of the Order after they ceased to be the personal possessions of Grandmaster de la Valette. Although the Treaty of Vienna of 1815 decreed that the French should return all items looted during the Napoleonic Wars, there was disarray in the Order of St John at the time and no claim was ever made by the Order.

Before World War II (WW2), Queensland was home to a small community of Maltese migrants, who worked mainly on the sugar cane fields around Mackay and Innisfail. Although small in numbers, this community was controversial due to negative racial and class-based prejudices which derided the Maltese as 'dagoes', threatening Australian wages and standards of living. These prejudices resulted in significant restrictions on Maltese migration, despite the Maltese being British subjects like Australians. Although the impact of specific initiatives cannot be measured, and some pre-war prejudices lingered, the war and new 'populate or perish' immigration policies which emerged from it represented a turning point in perceptions about the suitability of Maltese migrants. Indeed, the '1948 Australia - Malta Assisted Passage Agreement' officially recognised them as preferred migrants.

VERBA VOLANT - SCRIPTA MANENT - The history of Maltese emigration is significant due to the substantial impact it has had on both Malta and the many countries where Maltese people settled around the globe. It reflects Malta's long history as a source of migrants and the formation of vibrant Maltese diasporic communities that continues to shape both Malta and the world. We keep history alive for future generations.



RESTORATION OF CASTLE CANONS

Restored 18th-Century Cannons Return to Castille Square After Heritage Malta Intervention

Yesterday, a dedicated team from Heritage Malta arrived at Castille Square, Valletta, to reinstall the iconic 18th-century cannons in front of the Auberge de Castille.

Their return marks the completion of extensive restoration and conservation works carried out to preserve these important symbols of Malta's military history.

The cannons, which have stood proudly at one of the highest points in the capital, had suffered considerable degradation over the years due to exposure to the elements and occasional damage caused by passersby. Now, thanks to careful intervention by Heritage Malta's experts, they have been stabilised, treated, and restored to their former glory.

The Auberge de Castille, currently housing the Office of the Prime Minister, was originally built in the 1740s to serve as the headquarters for the Knights of the Order of St John from the langue of Castille, León and Portugal.

The cannons that adorn its entrance were not merely decorative, they were originally placed to serve a defensive purpose, reflecting the military might of the Knights and Malta's strategic importance in the Mediterranean.

Over the centuries, these cannons have become a familiar and photogenic feature of Valletta's historic streetscape, admired by both locals and tourists alike.

Their careful restoration ensures that they will continue to serve as a visual reminder of Malta's rich past and its ongoing commitment to cultural heritage.

Heritage Malta's work is part of a broader national effort to preserve and maintain historic artefacts in public spaces, ensuring they remain accessible and meaningful to future generations.

The restored cannons now stand once again at the foot of Castille, facing the Grand Harbour, as they did nearly 300 years ago, ready to greet all who pass by with silent strength and timeless elegance.
