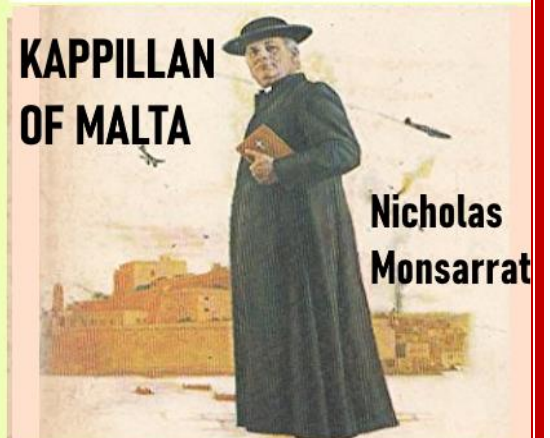

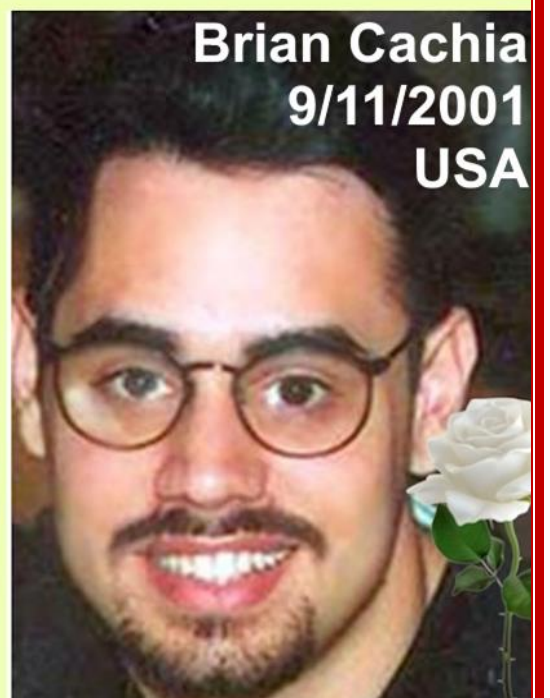

16 thousand kilometres away from home

At the distant shores of Wollongong Harbour, a piece of Malta came alive on Sunday, September 21, 2025 - an extraordinary day when the Maltese Diaspora celebrates Malta National Day.

This marked the very first Maltese Regatta in Australia, attracting a sizable crowd eager to witness an event steeped in Mediterranean -Maltese tradition. Organized by Louis Parnis, president of the George Cross Falcons Community Centre, the regatta aimed to revive a cherished childhood memory for Louis, one that he wished to share with a new generation here in Australia. “For years, I dreamed of seeing the boat races we enjoyed as kids in Marsa, Malta,” he reflected. Recalling his youthful days, he added, “As a nine-year-old, I would walk to the harbour with

my father, younger brother, and our dog”. The vibrant spectacle of boats and adorned in various colours and flags was unforgettable. “After my father passed, those memories became even more precious.”

This innovative event unfolded in partnership with the Wollongong City Surf Life Saving Club and received generous support from BlueScope and the WIN program. The day began with a warm welcome from the Lord Mayor of Wollongong City, Cr Tania Brown, followed by remarks from the Consul General of Malta in NSW, Anneliese Sammut and in her address she said she was also honoured to welcome NSW Minister for Planning & Public Space, the Hon. Paul Scully MP, Alison Byrnes MP, Carol Berry MP, Lord Mayor of Wollongong City, Cr Tania Brown and Mayor of Shellharbour, Chris Homer, to the celebration. The event was a proud celebration of Maltese heritage, culture, and community. the Consul General highlighted the significance of the date, 21 September – Malta’s Independence Day – a day of pride for all Maltese people.

Two boats and ten rowers participated in the exhibition race, beginning just outside the lighthouse. Louis expressed heartfelt gratitude to everyone involved in turning his dream into reality. “This is the first-ever Maltese regatta since the beginning of Maltese migration to Australia,” he noted.

“We’ve have had a splendid show, and buses brought people from Sydney to enjoy this special occasion.” He also acknowledged the overwhelming community support, thanking contributors from Malta, the Builders Club, Frankie’s Auto Electric, and local leaders from Wollongong, Shellharbour, and the Malta Consulate General. “We’re making a certificate of appreciation and a donation to the Clubs. We also thank the editor of the Maltese Journal for Maltes Living Abroad who supported us all the way by advertising this unique event.

THE HIDDEN MALTA IN THE USA



The Malta Tourism Authority (MTA) hosted a significant event in New York on Thursday night for the U.S. premiere of *Hidden Malta*, a captivating one-hour global television special. David Muscat appointed Malta's representative to State of Palestine

President Myriam Spiteri Debono presented the Letters of Appointment to David Muscat, as Malta's Representative to the State of Palestine, the government said Tuesday. Muscat succeeds Franklin J. Aquilina, who

was recently appointed Ambassador to Libya. Muscat's appointment as Malta's Representative to the State of Palestine took place on the same day that Malta, through Prime Minister Robert Abela, [formally recognised the State of Palestine](#) during the United Nations Assembly in New York, United States of America. During the meeting, held at San Anton Palace, the President highlighted that Malta's historic step, taken together with other nations, may serve to advance the cause of lasting peace.

Muscat reiterated the importance and the need for the Palestinian people in the Gaza Strip to continue receiving the necessary humanitarian assistance, noting that in recent days the Maltese Government had dispatched a consignment of 250 tonnes of flour.

The President further appealed for this historic step to be regarded as an opportunity to continue building and strengthening the relationship between Malta and the State of Palestine.

In Togo, mother and child at the heart of the Order of Malta's care

The [Elavagnon Regional Hospital](#), managed by the Order of Malta France since 1981, is strengthening its commitment to maternal and child health, particularly for disadvantaged populations. Its recently renovated Mother-Child Centre has been fully operational since

May 2025, with an official inauguration in September.

Since 1981, the Elavagnon Regional Hospital, managed by the Order of Malta France, has been working for maternal and child health, particularly for the most disadvantaged. A maternity hospital was integrated into it in 2016. Like the rest of the country, this region is experiencing significant population growth, of the order of 2.5% per year. This requires an adaptation of infrastructure and health services. Its modernised Mother-Child Centre has been fully active since May 2025 and was **inaugurated in September**.

The new Mother-Child Centre: a necessity This hospital is strengthening its services through the training of more than 60 staff members and the deployment of a mobile clinic for gynaecological and pediatric care in remote areas. High-risk pregnancies are referred to the hospital, **ensuring safety and comfort**. The project includes the restructuring of the Mother-Child Centre, which now has a maternity ward, a surgical block, a paediatrics unit and a neonatology unit.

For Valérie Péchard, head of the International Hospital Directorate of the Order of Malta France: "*This deployment will greatly reduce the number of complications and deaths among mothers and children*". Since its opening in May 2025, POME has **enabled more than 800 deliveries**, including several complex cases requiring specialized care. New hygiene standards have been introduced to safeguard the health of mothers and babies.

The new phase of the project and the inauguration of the Mother-Child Centre (POME) were celebrated on 12 September, in the presence of the Togolese Minister of Health, the President and the Ambassador of the Order of Malta, as well as numerous authorities. The ceremony, marked by a mass and the blessing of the building by the Bishop of Atakpamé, also **consecrated the hospital's chapel in the name of Saint Carlo Acutis**, recently canonized.



EMBASSY OF THE REPUBLIC OF MALTA IN FRANCE

The Embassy of Malta in France, together with the Permanent Delegation of Malta to UNESCO, celebrated the National Day of Malta with the diplomatic community and the Maltese community in Paris.

The occasion was a celebration of the deep-rooted friendship between Malta and France as European and Mediterranean partners bound by historical, cultural and social ties spanning generations. The event also underscored the common progressive vision and shared international commitments of France and Malta.



In the face of continued threats to peace, democracy and human rights, Malta and France remain promoters of their shared and inalienable values in their bilateral relations, in Europe, and in the multilateral sphere.

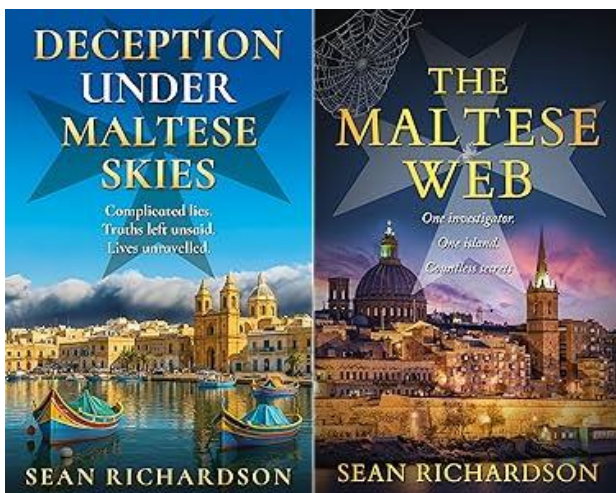
THE AMBASSADOR OF MALTA TO FRANCE

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EAGER TO PRESERVE THE MALTESE CULTURE IN ADELAIDE

One of the active members of the Maltese Community in Adelaide is Bernadette Buhagiar.

Bernadette, a fellow migrant from Malta, arrived in Australia with her family in 1986 and quickly became actively involved in preserving and promoting Maltese culture. For several years, she brought her children to the Maltese Language and Folk Dancing School, while also completing the South Australian Certificate of Education in Maltese herself.

Over the years, Bernadette has been deeply engaged in community life through many associations. She has contributed to the Maltese Chaplaincy Group at Lockleys and the Maltese Aged Care Association of South Australia. Since 1998, she has volunteered as a broadcaster with Maltese Radio on EBlfm, where she continues to serve today as President of its committee. The program, delivered in Maltese, keeps the community informed about events in Malta and Adelaide while also preserving the Maltese language and traditional music for younger generations.

Bernadette has also provided remarkable service to the St Catherine Society. She first joined in 2009 and was elected President in 2019, a role she still holds. Under her leadership, the society has maintained its tradition of monthly functions for members and its annual November celebration honouring St Catherine—the patron saint of Żejtun and Żurrieq, the hometowns of many Maltese migrants in Adelaide.

Her community service extends beyond the Maltese community. She has supported various charitable initiatives, including the South Australian Sports Girl Quest for the Channel 7 Christmas Appeal (1997), the Miss Junior SA Quest for the Epilepsy Association (1994–1995), and knitting scarves for the homeless at the Adelaide Day Centre in Queen Street. Through decades of voluntary service, Bernadette has devoted countless hours to uplifting others and preserving the cultural heritage of the Maltese community in South Australia. Her leadership, commitment, and generosity make her an outstanding member of the Maltese community of South Australia.





THOUSANDS ATTEND LATEST FESTA HUT EDITION

For another year running, Festa Hut proved to be a resounding success, drawing thousands of families to Mellieħa and Marsaxlokk for two evenings of celebration. The festival placed Malta's fishing and aquaculture

sector at centre stage, offering visitors the chance to enjoy fresh fish while engaging with the traditions and maritime heritage that shape the nation's coastal communities. Organised by the

Parliamentary Secretariat for Fisheries, Aquaculture and Animal Rights, the event had a dual purpose.

It celebrated the quality of Maltese fish and also encouraged awareness of sustainable fishing practices, ensuring that future generations will continue to benefit from the sea's resources.

The lively atmosphere across both days was marked by bustling fish stalls, educational exhibitions, live



music, games and entertainment for children, together with displays of local craftsmanship and cultural performances.

Parliamentary Secretary Alicia Bugeja Said highlighted the significance of the event, noting that it brings attention to the hard work of fishermen and reinforces their essential role in providing fresh and local produce for Maltese and Gozitan families.

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ONE OF THE PIONEER WOMEN OF MACKAY – QUEENSLAND TERESA BORG

Teresa Borg was born in Malta around the turn of the 20th Century. A handsome red headed young man would enter her life through a *Ghannej*, a singer sent by her husband-to-be Carmelo Mifsud to her home to request courtship. Teresa "loved the little Island of Malta with its narrow streets, stone buildings and beautiful churches."

Carmelo and Teresa married in Mosta Church on 15th April 1921. Carmelo was just 22 years old and Teresa was 20.

Carmelo decided to join his brother in a new land of opportunity - Australia - sending for his family later. In 1925 Teresa and their daughter Mary joined Carmelo in Australia.

"As she watched the ship *Oronsay* carry her beautiful brown eyed daughter Teresa and her granddaughter Mary to the far away land, Maria Borg knew in her heart she would never see them again." And she never did.

"Teresa turned and took one last look at her family and her little island Malta as she sailed out of Valetta Harbour to a country unknown."

It was dark when Teresa and Mary eventually joined Carmelo in Mackay. There were no other houses around. "Where are the crying babies?" Teresa asked. "There were no babies they are the noise Koalas make" Carmelo told her and so began Teresa's life in Australia.

This land so far from anywhere, so far from her family, and so different to Malta.

Carmelo and Teresa had bought a cane farm in Habana but times were hard. Teresa took all that she learned in Malta and was well known for making bread and for dressmaking. "She thought of Habana as little Malta. It wasn't so bad. Sunday afternoons were often spent at Eimeo beach with other Maltese families."

Teresa and Carmelo went on to have 11 more children. Teresa was so far away from her mother through the death of two of her children. She was a tiny quiet lady but very well respected in the community. The couple owned several sugar cane farms in Habana, Homebush and Alligator Creek, until retiring in West Mackay.

Teresa and Carmelo went on to have 38 grandchildren and even to enjoy quite a few great grandchildren before Teresa died in June 1979 and Carmelo passed away 3 months later.

"They have instilled in us a great love of family, religion and Australia and a great pride in our Maltese heritage." *Maryann Lister author of "Through our eyes, The Mifsud Journey."*

Mackay in Queensland has a significant and active Maltese community, which began with immigrants working in the sugar cane industry and has grown into the largest Maltese population outside of a capital city in Australia. The community's rich heritage is celebrated through groups like the **Mackay Maltese Club Inc.** and the **Mackay Maltese Community Group**, and it is honoured by the **Malta Garden** at the Mackay Botanic Gardens and a proposed statue at the historic "Maltese Corner".

With the harsh summer sun now starting to mellow, and with the rains about to come down in bucketsful any day now, the Maltese and Gozitan countryside will start being revived.

And as soon as the September rains start, the prickly pear palms which are such a feature of the countryside start shedding their fruit. A fruit which is enjoyed by many.

Teddy Farrugia is one of the farmers who at this time of year have whole corners of their land overflowing with prickly pear palms. In a comment to tvm.com.mt Teddy explained that prickly pears should ideally be harvested in the morning when the thorns are still soft after the night dew. Once the sun rises, the thorns become stiff.

All prickly pears are good, whether red, yellow or green. Nutritionist Dr Antonella Grima told tvm.com.mt that prickly pears contain fibre, vitamin C, natural sugar and only some 40 calories per 100 grams. Despite this, Dr Grima said prickly pears should be eaten in moderation and ideally washed down with a drink of water. Asked whether the taste of the prickly pear varied, Teddy explained that fruit from a young tree is sweeter in taste and has fewer seeds.

9/11/2001 SA- Maltese man who lost his life on that day



An unfortunate twist of events sealed Brian Cachia's fate

September 11th will forever be remembered as the day that changed the course of contemporary world history and this year marks 24 years since the tragic events unfolded in New York.

Amongst those who lost their life 19 years ago was Brian Joseph Cachia, an American citizen of Maltese descent. His grandfather, Joseph, originally from Zabbar, had emigrated to America during WWII and started a new life on the continent.

On the day of the attack, Brian had been called in to work earlier than usual. A technical problem caused the computer whizz to rush in to fix it. His office, situated on the 103rd floor of the North Tower, was within the trajectory of American Airlines flight 11 when it crashed into the tower at 8:46am. Facebook / Todd Hauser

In comments given to Times of Malta, family members narrate how at the time, 26 year-old Brian was one of the company's newest employees. He had been working for the company for approximately a month, and had proposed to his partner the week prior to the tragic events. "If only he hadn't gone in early... we never heard from him after the plane hit", Joseph reflects.

In a haunting YouTube video published on September 20th 2008, user kpharloff (a.k.a Kevin Harlow) posts a tribute to his family friend, and recounts intimate memories of their childhood together. Kevin recalls how in times past, Brian had owned a little keyboard and used to write melodies. In an ode to

his friend, Kevin recreates one of his tunes and adds his own twist to it. "Wherever you are now, my personal belief is that the mind cannot cease, it goes beyond the body but that's my belief. Brian wherever you are, this is to you".

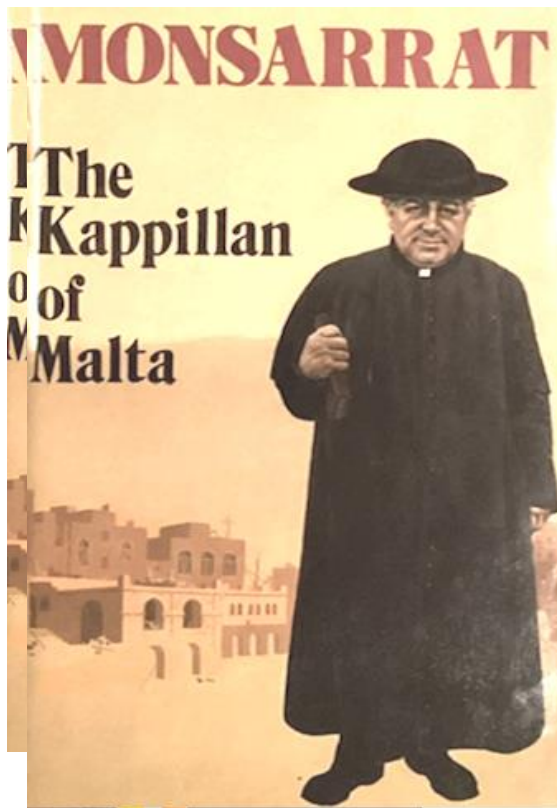
In total, 2,977 people perished that day - including over 400 firefighters and law enforcement officers – with more than 6,000 civilians and servicemen sustaining serious injury.

A TRIBUTE TO BRIAN JOSEPH CACHIA



Brian Joseph Cachia was one of the victims who tragically lost his life in the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. He was 26 years old and worked as a bond trader for Cantor Fitzgerald on the 105th floor of the North Tower of the World Trade Center. Brian was from Bayside, Queens, New York. He was remembered as a loving son, brother, and friend, with a warm personality and a deep love for his family. Friends and loved ones recalled his sense of humour, kindness, and passion for life.

Nicholas Monsarrat in GOZO

Monsarrat paid special attention to include Gozo in the KAPPILLAN OF MALTA novel. Monsarrat loved Gozo and did not want to leave the Gozitans out of his tribute to the Maltese people. Nicholas Monsarrat is an unjustly neglected author. If you have read any of his novels it will be *The Cruel Sea*.. His dates are 1910 – 1979 and, although he was born in Liverpool, he went to Winchester and Trinity, Cambridge. In the war he served in the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve (RNVR), rising to command a frigate by the end of the war. After the war he combined a career in the Foreign Office with writing novels, often sea stories. He eventually retired and went to live on Gozo NEAR small island off Malta. *The Kappillan of Malta* is a wonderful novel, ostensibly about just six days between June 1940 and August 1942 in Malta. In fact he weaves into his war story the history of the island – and what a rich and interesting story that is. Yet again I was reminded how fortunate England is not to have been invaded properly since 1066.

Malta's history starts in about 6,000 BC; its megalithic temples are not to be missed should you visit Gozo. But I was really more interested in the waves of more recent conquest: Phoenicians, Romans, Arabs, Normans, Spain. Spain did not place a high price on the island and in 1530 almost gave it away to the Order of Knights of the Hospital of Saint John of Jerusalem – better known as the Knights of Malta today. This ancient order of noble, Catholic knights from all over Europe had been chivied out of Jerusalem, Cyprus and Rhodes by the Ottomans. Malta was a gift from the Holy Roman Emperor, Charles V, in return for an annual tribute: a Maltese Falcon. I digress but the 1941 film, *The Maltese Falcon*, is a real, film noir, cracker and I have just ordered Dashiell Hammett's 1930 novel of the same name, on which the film is based.

The Knights were conquered by Napoleon, and in his turn he relinquished the island to the British. I was captivated by Monsarrat's story and not just because I'm going to Valletta later this month. Two other threads in this literary tapestry are Catholicism and the role of the Royal Navy in the Mediterranean in WW II. He populates his story with a cross section of the unfortunate population besieged on the island. Perhaps he is too generous to the British and the Royal Navy but that reflects his background.

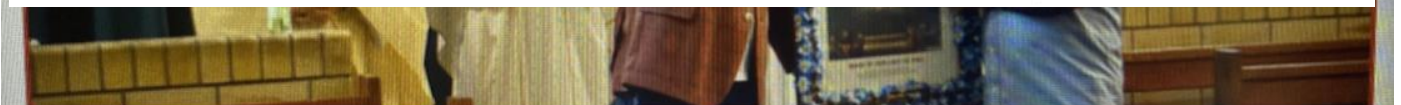

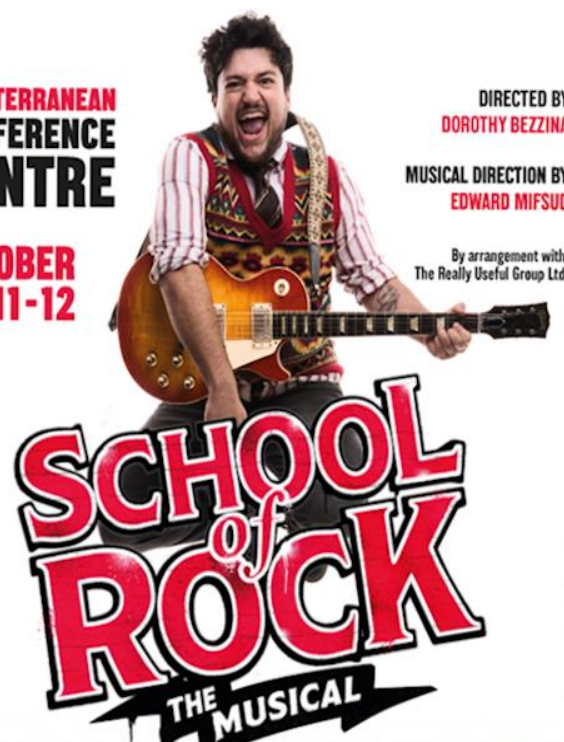
